Briefs from here and there...

Fr. Bob Hogan of Dubuque, Iowa says his first big trip was a flop. He planned on flying from Dubuque to Worland, Wyoming to hunt deer. The forecast was good, but as he got farther west the ceilings kept getting worse and he finally had to land at Wognen, South Dakota. The next three days were spent there in the middle of a big low pressure area. When it finally lifted he had to return to Dubuque.

Fr. John Walsh writes from Belleville, Illinois that although he's never been able to get to any convention he does enjoy the communication via the newsletter. Anyone flying in the Belleville area might want to land at Bi-State Parks Airport. It's within the boundaries of John's parish.

Fr. Gerry Gefell, chaplain at Ft. Bragg, North Carolina, missed the convention in Ames because his instrument check ride came at the same time. He's hoping for better luck this year.

The Fort Bragg Army flying club is by far the largest military club in business. They boost 400 active pilots, 24 airplanes, 18 instructors and a fully accredited FAA and VA flight instruction school. All ratings are possible including helicopter, DC 3 and even Lear jet.

Gerry, along with Father John McCullagh, Division Chaplain, 82nd Abn. Div., bought a Cherokee Arrow 200 last February. Gerry got his instrument rating in it; John is now completing his commercial and beginning instrument work. They rent the Arrow to other club members and it has become the most popular plane in the club.

Frank also goes on to say that winter flying in northern Montana is not too probable due to cold engine starting and deep snow on runways so the "bird" sets most of the five months of winter.

Fr. Thoralf Thielen of the Josephinum School of Theology in Worthington, Ohio is on a sabbatical leave. He has a HEW-NIMH grant with an appointment as post-doctoral fellow in the Division of Family Life, Department of Psychiatry, University of Pennsylvania (Philadelphia) to do advanced clinical work in marriage and family life counseling. When he finishes in July he is to inaugurate a similar counselling program in the theological curriculum for the clinical training of the seminarians and clergy in the Columbus, Ohio area beginning in September of this year.

Several have asked for more information about him and his work. His work is geared primarily toward liturgical renewal--reaching the elders in the Parish by using children. His Bishop has given him permission to "free lance" in this particular type of work.

Fr. Remi Rayant of Shakopee, Minnesota, tried Schweitzer gliding last summer and found the control response utterly different from powered planes, requiring a fantastic adjustment of flying reflexes.

A couple of months ago he nearly washed out because of a semantics problem. He rented a Cub-converted to 90 H.P. and wing-end plates involving slight wing area increase. He asked, "Any special thing I should know about this ship?" He was told plane "floated a bit" otherwise no problem. He ran into an unforecasted front and was forced to turn back. The turn shook loose the float gauge resulting in high gas consumption and forced him to land at the nearest field. The wind velocity had doubled and the plane did not just "float", it landed 10 mph slower resulting in a bad bounce. The throttle didn't catch to "esse her down" and he plopped down the hardest in his life. Inspection revealed no damage and the newly acquired knowledge made for a perfect landing at home.

Retired Army Chaplain John Brucker of Fort Loramie, Chio, owned a plane till two years ago when he sold it because he didn't have time to fly. His spare moments now are taken up in fishing.

Fr. Martin Pfab of Osage, Iowa began flying this past year and solved on July 5th. On January 4th, he was sworn in as a Chaplain in the National Guard.

Vern J. Schaefer of Byron, Minnesota, flew Msgr. R. J. Jansen to Sioux City for the installation of his classmate, Bishop Francis Greteman. While there they visited NAPP member, Msgr. Ben Bauer, rector of the Cathedral of the Epiphany.

Vern led a pilgrimage of 27 people to Europe in October. They stopped at Lourdes and Fatima to give thanks for 25 good years in the priesthood.




