Hopefully everyone is planning to join in on the NAPP convention in Dubuque this coming <u>July 12-15</u>. Planning is continuing and further details are unfolding.

Please consider an early registration for the sake of better planning and more realistic budgeting process. All of your good efforts can and will be reflected in your convention fee.



If you arrive on Monday before too late in the evening, please consider signing up – online – for the **Happy Hour Cruise on the American Lady Yacht**: americanladycruises.com/happy-hour-cruise. Click the "Book Now" button at the bottom to make individual reservations; reservations can only be made online. It is \$23.49 per person and includes drinks and heavy appetizers. If we know well enough in advance who is signed up for this, we can provide transportation to and from the cruise. The cruise is from 5:30 to 7 p.m.

We would like to know your shirt sizes. I was able to work out a great deal for a button-down, collared, light-fabric, short-sleeve shirt (with a left pocket) as the annual shirt of the convention. (IA8), and a trip to the <u>Field of Dreams</u>. We then head back to the hotel for a few hours of rest and conclude the evening with a social and cookout at the **Resurrectory** (the rectory of Resurrection parish) hosted by many of my good-natured and fun parishioners.

Wednesday morning, scheduled from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m., there will be a **historic tour of Dubuque** on a trolley. (What is an NAPP convention without a trolley?) Perhaps the annual meeting could follow that?



# Welcome to new member Fr. Alex Nevitt

I first fell in love with flying as a child. My mother is a flight attendant with United Airlines and so we were always traveling. Whether it was a short flight from EWR to ORD, or going all the way across the ocean to BRU almost twice a year, I actually thought I would one day become a pilot.



My parents even let me

start flying at the tender age of 12, with my first lesson the day after Christmas. However, I got as far as I could by the time I was 14 and aviation went on pause. I always knew I would pick it back up again, but I had changed my dream from being a pilot to being a stockbroker. As time went on, though, restarting became more difficult and more expensive.

Learning to fly got pushed even further back when I first felt the calling to the priesthood in college. I thought for a while maybe I would be a missionary priest, serving in Africa and flying from mission to mission, but my heart was called back home, to become a priest in the <u>Diocese of Paterson</u>, New Jersey.

When I entered the seminary, I was sent to do my pretheology at Theological College in Washington, D.C. It was a great experience and I am grateful to so many of the priests who started my formation in the Sulpician tradition. It was great being so near to the Nation-

al Basilica and being right there to participate in the March for Life. It really is a special place, Catholic University of America (CUA), as you live in a little bubble of Catholicism. However, I was quickly woken up to the reality of seminary when I arrived and that it is not like college. I thought I would be able to take advantage of IAD being a UA hub and fly all over the world every weekend, but I

was quite mistaken. But I did get to travel to China and Brazil during my time of studies at CUA.

After finishing pre-theology, the Bishop chose to send me to Rome for my theology studies. Nothing quite beats being at the center of our Church. Plus, if ever you are on the approach to CIA, the view you get of the Vatican is spectacular. It was an approach I got to experience multiple times, traveling around Europe going to missionary parishes in Kazakhstan and Armenia. I always wanted to reach out to those places that were off the beaten track, the spots most people would never think about. And each experience, regardless of language barrier, was always an opportunity for encountering Christ and my brother or sister.

It was also a time where I met quite a few Navy pilots who would rotate in and out of Naples at the Navy base where I got to live my diaconate pastoral experience.

The highlight of my time in Rome was having the opportunity to encounter the Holy Father. And while the handshake and photos were great, the most memorable experience was watching him wash the feet of prisoners (some of whom weren't even Catholic) I had taught in my scripture classes.

I was finally ordained to the priesthood May 11, 2019. It was an incredible experience and I still remember it as if it was yesterday. I was even blessed to have some of my classmates from Rome attend, since they were being ordained the following week. However, as someone sent to the North American College, instead of going into a parish after ordination, I went back to

Rome to complete an STL in Seminary Formation. This was cut short by the pandemic and I returned to the U.S. from Italy just a day after my 29th birthday.

I was glad to finally be able to participate in parish ministry and help my great friend and mentor priest Fr. Owen B. Moran set up his parish digitally. It was also during this time that I was given my parish assignment

AOPA has begun a series of FREE monthly safety seminars to help "keep the rust off" general aviation pilots like us.



The webinar series covers aviation topics in an upbeat manner that provides an extra dose of flying lore and helps pilots who have been out of the cockpit for a while get back up to speed.

Episodes concentrate on ways you can enhance your flying skills and knowledge from home, including the use of flight simulators, building confidence with radio communications, airspace, and aeronautical charts.

Upcoming episodes include "Knocking off the rust. What could go wrong?" and "Is your airplane rusty too?" <u>Click here</u> to register for the series and receive email notifications about future *Don't Get Rusty* episodes.

### Here are some topics from past episodes:

While I could only see those that were offered in March and April at the time of my writing this article, they give the idea that AOPA is trying to make seasonal training timely for those areas of aviation that carry seasonal challenges. Watching these seminars also gives the pilot WINGS credits.

of Notre Dame of Mt. Carmel Church in Cedar Knolls, New Jersey. It would be my first parish assignment of longer than just a summer, plus I found time to finally get back into flying.

I had saved up my ordination money to help pay for lessons and went to KMMU to shop different schools and find the best price and fit. None of them believed me when I said I was a Catholic priest. They thought I was too young and whoever heard of priest pilots? I didn't until I Googled it and found out about NAPP.

I started my lessons again (so glad I still had my logbook) at Certified Flyers and was blessed to have my first solo on January 1, 2021. I promise you that Mary was receiving many prayers and asking for intercessions as I did my first three laps in the pattern on my own

It has been an incredible experience being in the air again and sharing the love of flying with others – but

also being able to share the faith with others on the ramp, since oftentimes I have to run right from a lesson to Mass and so will be in my collar. The first reaction is always disbelief that a priest is flying, but it then always changes to a fruitful and spiritual conversation.

I am glad to join you brothers as a pilot priest and ask you to pray for me as I continue my training and approach my check ride.
