


# Central Region Is Alive + Well!

We Kansans are really looking forward to sharing our Kleen, Kleer air of the beautiful Sunflower State, enjoying seeing you eye-ball to eye-ball, doing some hanger-flying together, renewing old acquaintances and making new ones, flying together, skling, etc. So far, fifteen have indicated they are coming and interest has been really good for soaring and the trip to the Wichita Cessna plant. Golf, skling, and boozing seem to be quite acceptable too. You received the basic schedule in the previous Newsletter.

You will really enjoy this Big-Little City in the heart of America, home of William Allen White, Kansas State Teacher's College, College of Emporia, George's Pad. These are just some of the reasons for it's fame. Hosting you this year are NAPPer's Bob Pool, Pastor of Corning, Kansas (owner of a Cessna 172 by dern!) and George Seuferling, Campus Minister, (he jest rentz a baloon). Other neat people who will be showing you fine Kansas hospitality are Thelma Bowes, George's cousin who keeps his body well fed, Karen Smith the other Catholic Campus Minister, Evie Parenti, congenial secretary of UMHE, Cliff Robertson and Bill Burke of Kansas Flying Service, Tom McCoy of the Municipal airport, Jerry Scott of the AKL Fraternity(where we will be housing you sky pilots). Some of you may want to come in on Sunday, July 16 and you are most welcome--not much planned but we can surely visit and take it easy. One has indicated he would like to go to Pittsburg Monday and tour the Helio Courier Plant. In the afternoon we will water ski, swim and enjoy an outdoor picnic at Pamona Lake. (40 miles NE of Emporia, and there is a strip there but no lights, elevation 1050, 18/36 gravel strip, 2,300 feet) Tuesday we hope to devote to soaring (if the weather does not cooperate, we will play golf, view FAA movies, etc.), and will have a special Mass in the evening and a business meeting.

Wednesday we'll fly to Wichita and tour the Cessna plant and plan to have sufficient planes available so we can fly a sort of convoy. Afternoon can be golfling or swimming and some may want to leave--you are welcome to stay till Thursday.

Emporia is really easy to find and we have a fine airport—just eye-ball your Kansas City Sectional about midway between KCMo and Wichita and there is Emporia. We have our own FSS on the field, freq. 123.6, and the omni just five miles SE is 112.8. Location is lat:38-20, Long: 96-11, elevation 1204, 5 miles South of the City; Runways: 18/36-3,800 feet, bituminous; 6-24, 3,900 turf; 11-29-3,000 turf. Fuel Phillips 80/87, 100/130, minor repairs; Unicom 123.0.

We will have Bob Pool's 172 and can possibly pick some of you up in Wichita or Kansas City. But because your Emporia Host may be attending the Comvention in Miami, Fla. July 9-15, we do need your cooperation. Please return the enclosed card as quickly as you can, especially if we need to coordinate transportation. If you give us your phone number as to where you will be Sat. evening, July 15, we may be able to save some trips, e.g. if two or more are coming into K.C., Mo., and need to be picked up, we can tell you where to meet and who to meet there. Commercial transportation into Emporia is not the most swift in the nation, so will be enclosing about all the possible alternatives.

Buses leave from Kansas City to Emporia (about 2 hours 45 minutes for the journey) at 2:00 A.M., 7:30 A.M., 9:30 A.M., 2:00 P.M., 5:15 P.M., and 9:15 P.M.; from Wichita (about one and a half hour trip) 1:15 A.M., 7:30 A.M., 12:45 P.M., 5:00 P.M., 7:40 P.M. Most of the time the bus stops out on the Turnpike, (about 5 miles out of town), so call either my home phone or the UMHE and we will arrange to pick you up. Should you get stranded in K.C. or Wichita, call those two numbers collect (Identify yourself as NAPP) and we will see what we can do.

Amtrak schedules from K.C. (2 hour trip) 5:15 P.M., II:00 P.M., and 2:10 A.M.; from Wichita 1:50 A.M., Biggest hassle with the bus and the train is getting from the "unicipal airport to the other terminal.

From the Municipal Air Terminal K.C., Mo., "Air Associates" has a commuter flight service (\$19.00 one way) but it is by Reservation only, and so you can call this toll free number: 800-362-2626; flights to Emporia: #104 leaves 1:35 P.M. #122 leaves 2:25 P.M.; same company, reservation only from Wichita: #121 leaves 11:00 A.M., and #105 at 4:25 P.M. (cost \$17.00).

Keep this information handy and we are surely looking forward to seeing you in Kansas in July. Shalom and may we wish you "one landing for each take-off."



Father Joe Miksch of Hartington, Nebraska is an Associate Pastor of Holy Trinity Parish and teaches the following subjects at Cedar Catholic High School: Religion, Latin, and Aviation Science. He got his private ticket in 1968 and flew about 120 hours last year in borrowed Cessnas and Tri-Pacers.

Father Jack Lawler of Pinehurst, Mass. took the twin commanche to Freeport, Bahamas over Thanksgiving but departed from his usual route by returning via Disney World. "As of this date," he says, "the place to land is Kissimmee. It is 11 miles to D. W. from here whereas it is about 28 from Orlando. They have a minibus that makes runs when necessary to the Park and the fare is about the same as car rental. They have about 7 cars for rental and round trip will run about \$13 so this is a more reasonable method of travel. One precaution-get there at 8 in the morning. I arrived at the field at noon and there was no transportation and they had closed the park because of the crowds. The next day I landed at 8, and was in the park at 9:15. There are no rooms in the general area unless you stay at D. W. but reservations should be made months in advance and it is costly. I flew over to Melbourne-60 miles and they have a fine motel at the terminal building, very reasonable, good eating facilities and the plane is at the door."

"Came back to Boston non-stop, 1150 miles and at 7500' and 65% of power, clocked 172 mph ground speed, 6:45 hours on 96 gals. of gas. Still had enough for 12 hours."

Father Tom De Carlo is part of a Youth Team Ministry in Des Moines and compiled 260 hours in his first year of flying. He belongs to a Club and does his flying in a PA-32 or Cessna 177.

Benedict Meyer, O.S.B. is temporarily still at home in Cedar Grove, Indiana doing parish work and taking care of his aged mother. Upon her departure from this life, he will return to Peruvian Mission work.

Ben has S.E.L. and sail plane ratings. He rents the powered craft and belongs to a sailplane club.

Col. Gerard Gefell, a charter member, is now Command Chaplain of the U.S. Army, Pacific and presently is based in Honolulu. He owns at Piper Arrow and got in 280 hours last year.

Father Theodore Cilwick of Charleston, South Carolina got his license in 1969 and has logged 160 hours to date, 40 the past year, in rented 150's and 172's.

Father Earle A. Newman of the Josephite Fathers and Brothers is teaching an instrument course in their school. After 17 year interim he started flying again last September. In November he was made a major in CAP and is Chaplain to the Kent County Senior Squadron, Delaware Wing.

Chaplain James Kelley of the Naval Hospital, Great Lakes, Illinois now has his CFI-airplanes and is working on his instrument instructor's rating.

Army Chaplain Carl Kulo sends greetings from Okinawa. Except for a summer of water rationing and the strikes and demonstrations for and/or against reversions to Japan, he says his assignment is a rewarding and pleasant one.

Carl had been flying with the local aero club but with little or no opportunity for cross country or instrumental flying, he resigned his membership.

Retired AF Chaplain Harold Kuhns is serving as an auxiliary Chaplain at Vandenberg AFB and is also working as a part time flight instructor at Lompoc Flight Service, Lompoc, California.

Father Joe Fox, chaplain at Our Lady of the Skies, Kennedy Airport, says he can readily supply meeting rooms there. Landing fee is only \$5.00 outside peak hours (8-10 a.m. Monday-Friday and 3-8 p.m. everyday). TCA is fine but plane must have a transponder to get in.

Father Frank Nemmers, Rt. 1, Carroll, Iowa uses his Cessna 172 to great advantage in his work as Vocation Director of the Sioux City Diocese visiting colleges and seminarians. He bought a used 50cc Honda for \$50.00, sawed it in half and gives him good ground transportation. Fits well in the rear of the 172 with the back seat removed. Frank has passed the instrument written and is nearing completion of the flying part too.

Father James Kremeier of Greeley, Nebraska is the owner of a J3 Cub Reed clipped wing conversion and has begun a course in aerobatics. A good confidence builder. The small town of 650 has a new airport in the making. Runway 200 x 3000. At present it consists of two hangers and a wind sock-all built with local volunteer labor and not much money.
