February 1 John Herzog, a couple from Mason City and myself flew Mooney 6070Q to California for a week's visit with relatives and friends. The weather was severe clear all the way out with a resultant beautiful flight. I dropped the other 3 off at Hollywood-Burbank and went on to San Diego. 2 hours after I landed we brought an end to the driest

winter in 70 years and the rain was still falling when we left a week later. The couple with us flew commercially during the week to Phoenix to visit their son in Globe, Arizona where he teaches on the Apache reservation. John and I had an interesting IFR flight from the L.A. area on Monday, Feb. 9 to Globe where we had to "sneak" out through a valley VFR to get to better conditions toward El Paso. From there is tail winds all the way. When we left L.A. at 10:00 a.m. Iowa time it was 56 degrees. When I landed in Mason City at 12:30 a.m. the next morning it was 57 in cold and wintry Iowa. We wrote our friends and suggested they might think of a winter vacation in Iowa sometime.

On Thursday, February 12, GADO office in Des Moines sponsored an FAA safety seminar for the Mason City area. The flight safety specialist from GADO in

Minneapolis and Des Moines were the other speakers in addition to myself. My talk followed the presentation from the FAA man from Minneapolis. Ned Powers from Des Moines suggested I go next so that he could correct all the wrong things I'd say. I spoke on proper flight planning, especially during winter flying, and used my flight from L.A. to Globe as an example. The flight was one in which we knew we were flying into icing conditions and possible imbedded thunderstorms. But in the 1½ hours I spent the night before planning a 2½ hour flight I always had at least one, and most of the time, two outs. Result: not really a dangerous flight.

In Ned's presentation following mine he said that he had instructed in San Diego area some years ago and one of his students was Fr. Art Beech. (Perhaps some remember him from the early days of NAPP). Anyway Ned was talking with Art one day and said, "You know, for all the flying I do, I've never had a mishap. Somebody up there must really be watching out for me." To which Art replied, "Has it

occurred to you that maybe he doesn't want you."

"A Roman Catholic priest was killed in a 210 feet drop of his gliding kite, in which he had just set the world kite gliding record, authorities reported today.

The Rev. Greg Hannen, 37, was killed instantly Saturday when the kite from which he was suspended plummeted downward and hit a highway 300 miles from Sydney.

He had glided for two hours, 15 minutes, bettering the world

overland endurance record by more than 45 minutes.

Hannen was described by a church superior as "as a man with a spirit of adventure which couldn't be stifled."

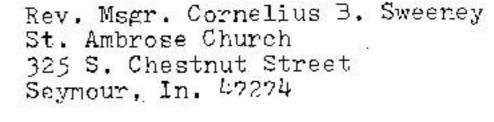
