

John Hemann was born in Stacyville, Iowa, attended Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa and was ordained from Mt. St. Bernard Seminary, Dubuque, on January 30, 1960. Since then he has served in city parishes in Cedar Rapids, Dubuque, Mason City and presently is a member of a Team Ministry in Waterloo and Evandsdale, Iowa. His parish work has also been mixed with teaching in high school for 12 years. As a member of the Pastoral Team of two parishes, along with three other priests, three sisters and one lay person, he is responsible for Parish Family Life and Communications. John presently is Pre Cana Director for the Waterloo Area and functions as a Marriage Counselor as well as teaching Marriage Enrichment in the city wide adult education program.

In 1968 he began taking graduate classes at Aquinas Institute of Theology in Dubuque and has also spent some time in summer work at St. John's University in Collegeville, Minn.

John is a Charter member of NAPP and has attended every convention except Rapid City and Emporia when military duty kept him away.

He began flying on July 16, 1963, soloed on August 26, 1963 in an Aeronca Champ. On July 8, 1964 he received his private ticket in a Tri-Pacer. During his ten years of flying he has been a member of a Club in Dubuque, owned in partnership and later alone, a Cherokee 140. Presently he shares ownership in a Bonanza with brother Ev and Father Dan Knipper, both NAPP members. John has logged over 600 hours which have taken him to both Coasts, Canada and Juneau. His log book shows that he's visited 28 states and 5 Canadian Provinces. He is presently working at his IFR rating.

On April 19, 1966 John enlisted in the Iowa Army National Guard as a Chaplain and presently serves with the 34th Inf. Bde. which is Headquartered in Boone, Iowa. His military rank is that of Captain and he is presently in line to become senior chaplain for the Bde. next year. During summer field training and once in awhile on a weekend drill he's gotten some dual time in military fixed wing and of recent years has gotten some dual chopper time.




AIR FORCE MUSEUM

Local Priests Offer Mass At Hawaiian Leper Colony

Three Covington Priests, Rev. Albert E. Ruschman, Rev. Richard Niehaus and Rev. Henry Haacke, concelebrated Mass at the Hawaiian island of Molokai Leper Colony made famous by Father Damien, Thursday, October 11. The Mass was offered in the church built by the Belgian priest who ministered to the lepers until he himself contracted the disease and died.

In Damien's time, no one who entered the colony was again allowed to leave it. Damien stayed for 16 years. His cause is being considered for canonization. Then, the only approach to the island was by sea. Today the airplane provides additional access.

To reach Molokai, Father Haacke rented a Cherokee 140 at Honolulu International Airport and personally piloted the priests to Kalaupapa airport on Molokai island. Thirty miles of water separate Cahu and Molokai islands, but the priests wore life preservers in the single engine plane and were required to report on leaving Koko Head and again on reaching Ilio Point on Molokai. Army helicopters are available for immediate rescue of any plane in trouble. After visiting the leper colony, now numbering only 150 patients, and saying Mass, the priests circled the entire island of Molokai en route home to Honolulu and were able to get good views of Maui and Lanai islands also on the return flight.

Father Haacke recalled that in the check-out for renting the plane, he was required to make several touch and go landings on Ford Island in Pearl Harbor and had quite a good view of the remains of the Arizona and Utah destroyed during the Dec. 7, 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor by the Japanese.

Editor and newsletter "putter together" Mel Hemann of Mason City, Iowa flew to Chicago the day after Thanksgiving to attend the 2nd annual National Youth Pro-Life Coalition Convention. Accompanying him in Mooney 6070Q were 4 High School students, 5 sleeping bags and 4 suitcases. All of that coming out of a Mooney at the Elgin airport caused about as many popping eyes and quizzical stares as one sees in an old Marx Brothers' movie.

About the same time another member of the flying Hemann trio, Ev, was winging his way with the Bonanza to visit relatives in Wichita.

Dick Funke of the Metropolitan Tribunal in Dubuque, Iowa flew the Club's Cherokee 6 to Washington, D.C. for the Canon Law Society meeting in early November.

This one (Mel again) has been appointed by the Archdiocesan Family Life Director to two positions. The one is regional director with the responsibility for all Family Life activities and programs within that region. The other position is Archdiocesan Co-Ordinator for the Marriage Encounter movement.

Redemptorist John Bellon wrote the following toward the end of October:

Just finished preaching two Spiritual Renewals for Jim Kremeier, one at Burwell - home parish - and Ericson, Nb. mission parish.

We did quite a bit of flying in his 172 Skyhawk during these two weeks - the Lord blessing us with ideal flying weather.

Jim regretted not being able to go to Alaska with us but plans on New Orleans if he can get a padre for supply. I am trying to get him one but if any of the NAPP know of priests who can supply in the summer in July - our dates for the convention - it would be a wonderful gesture to mention them so more NAPP could make use of them and be able to swell our attendence.

Was at Ben Bauer's in Algona, Iowa for a Eucharistic weekend first weekend in October. Saw Dave Hogan and Frank Nemmers there too.

Been showing Alaska slides to all. Brings back fond memories of a most wonderful trip and meeting.
