Dear Father Hemann:

The correct address for St. Joseph Hall is 2901 South Carrollton Ave., New Orleans, La. 70118.

- 1. With reference to the National Convention of the National Association of Priest Pilots, Inc. to be held at St. Joseph Hall on July 15 to 17, we would recommend that the priests attending the convention land at the New Orleans Lakefront Airport. We will be very happy to organize transportation between the airport and the seminary. The airport is not very far from the seminary.
- 2. For those priests who prefer to land at New Orleans International Airport, we suggest that they take the limousine down to the Fontainebleau Motor Motel on South Carrollton Ave. and Tulane Ave. fare \$3.50, and take a taxi to the Seminary fare about \$1.25.
- 3. Monday morning we should have the Board Meeting and offer, as options, flights around the New Orleans area, over the Mississippi Delta, as well as special sightseeing tours.

Monday evening we could have a concelebrated Mass at 5:30, followed by a social hour. Monday night the General meeting. Afterwards, if you care, time for the group to tour the French Quarter and dine in one of the restaurants, listen to some jazz, etc.

4. Tuesday morning we recommend that you take the four hour Bayou trip on the Mark Twain or the SS President touring the harbor, or the SS Voyageur going all the way to the Chalmette Battlefield, etc.

At 5:30 Tuesday evening we could have the Liturgy, followed by dinner at Antoine's. This dinner at Antoine's will have to be made as soon as possible, as reservations have to be made way in advance.

- 5. For those priests who would like to stay over after the convention, we would be glad to arrange tours of plantation homes, visit to Baton Rouge and the State Capitol, deep sea fishing, tour of Evangeline country, trips to the Mississippi Gulf Coast, opportunities to play golf, etc.
- 6. Some of the priests might prefer to stay at some of the local hotels. If so, we would be happy to make reservations at the Braniff Place, the Fontainebleau Motor Motel, the Marriott Hotel or at one of the hotels in the French Quarter, as soon as we hear from you.

St. Joseph Hall has accommodations for 70 priests.

We look forward to hearing from you soon.




Dear Dick,


The beginning of March we'll be airborne again.
