



MIDWEST REGIONAL MEET

The Midwest Region met on Monday, April 25, at the Mason City, IA airport.

Nineteen members were present. Weather kept some VFR folks away. We had a presentation about the operation of the TOP OF IOWA WIND ELECTRIC PLANT. The "wind farm" covers roughly 5,900 acres of cropland on 49 separate land parcels. The wind turbines with their rotor blades generate enough energy to provide electricity for 30,000 Midwest homes. Amazing how one can use "the wind" to create

We traveled to the Golden Grain ethanol plant, the newest in Iowa, where the alcohol is extracted from the kernel of corn and then blended to make "ethanol" fuel. After the alcohol has been removed the corn is then distributed to cattle and hog feeders throughout the country. We were told that the food value of the corn is not lost in the process, thus, each kernel of corn provides a twofold purpose - fuel

for engines and fuel for animal food.

Some of the folks were VERY DISAPPOINTED. When you tour a winery or brewery, often times you get "SAMPLES" to drink; such was not the case here. We received NO PURE "ALCOHOL" samples.
