Not about to let the insult go by, John said: "I made it out of MD80 parts. Another landing like that and I'll have enough parts for another one."







Many of you attended the NAPP lowa convention in 1984. John and I, along with our sister, hosted our 25th anniversaries in religious life on our home farm in northern Iowa. Featured aerobatic pilot at the air show was Duane Cole. Perhaps you read some of the press releases announcing his death about a month ago. Duane was 89 and had been in failing health for the past 2 years.

I first met Duane in 1962 when his family dedicated the new airport in Decorah, Iowa. Duane flew his clipped wing Taylorcraft. Son Rollie flew the 450 hp Steerman and his mother Judy was the wing walker. Son John, a high school senior at the time, was the announcer. Daughter Karen was 8 and just along for the ride.

I was president of our flying club and had the responsibility of entertaining them while they were in town. Before they left Wednesday morning Rollie took me for an exciting ride in the Steerman. 10 days later he was killed in that plane at the EAA flyin in Rockford. (EAA moved to Oshkosh two years later). The communications following that tragedy cemented a 40 year friendship with the Coles.

I would meet Duane and Judy at their booth every time I went to Oshkosh. I often felt Duane was one of NAPPs greatest promoters. He would always introduce me to the crowd and talk at great length about the "flying priests." His plane is now on permanent display in the EAA museum in Oshkosh.

Duane had 30,000 hours of flying, almost all without a radio. May he rest in peace!


