





From Peter Geldard in the UK My Dear Mel,

It seems such a long time since I last wrote that you must have thought that I had disappeared etc.! But be assured - I am very much alive and kicking! And have done quite a bit of flying recently. I have just come back from flying down to Corsica in the PA28. Did some 30 hours in 8 days which is not bad considering the extortionate cost of fuel over here. The weather was wonderful and I did the longest sea crossing - 120 nautical miles - I have ever done in a single. The plane flew without a missed beat. Next week, I complete my six approaches etc. to keep my FAA IR current. [Although technically I cannot 'use' the rating till we have the plane put on the American registry - which we are still contemplating - I am keen to keep my IR current for the skill etc.

I read with great sadness the news of the death of Jim Kelly. I said Mass for him the other day at the University. He was the bald-headed guy who had been in the Navy? I remember his kindness and conversations last year with gratitude. From what he described of his work, life was always 'marginal' due to the terrible conditions up in Alaska. May he rest in peace.

When I do come across again, I would love to meet up - not least to have your kind supervision to make sure that I am 'current' and bring me up to date.

Please could you give my kind regards (and apologies) that I cannot be at the annual gathering in New Mexico this year. I had originally planned another trip to the States but

that will have to await for another year at least to date with all the news etc.

From your last email, you seem to have been doing some travelling lately. Where are you at present: In Florida or Ohio?

Do give my regards to your brothers and encourage some of the brethren at the NAPP convention to make a trip to this side of the pond. I can always offer them my apartment at the Chaplaincy in Canterbury and we could go foreign' to France etc. in the plane if they wanted.

Dear Mel,

I wanted to get this mail off before the convention so as to pass along my regards for the upcoming get together. It has been some years since I was last in touch so thought it time to send greetings as my life is now settled for a few years.

First the new home address: Fr. Michael A. Mikstay 126 Reservation Dr. Gulfport, MS 39503 H (228) 328-2644 W (228) 871-2454 Since you all left me at the 1997 convention at Cherry Point MCAS (by the way that is North Carolina and not South Carolina as the directory lists it) my life has been extremely hectic. I left Cherry Point in October of 1997 and went to a brand new ship, the USS Bataan (LHD 5). I was the first priest assigned or as I like to say "the Founding Father." After 30 months on ship and several deployments, I received orders to Bahrain. It is an island in the Persian Gulf about 25 miles off the coast of Saudi Arabia.

These orders were to U.S. Naval Forces Central Command / Fifth Fleet. I worked for a three star admiral who was directly under General Tommy Franks whom you see often on TV (he is the head of Central Command and is in charge of the operations in Afghanistan). My orders were supposed to be for 12 months only. I ended up staying 16 months. During that time I was traveling out of the country 23 times. It was a tremendous experience, but I am so thankful to be home.

I was involved in many types of operations in the Middle East. The most difficult one was the USS Cole response. I was on board the Cole 18 hours after the bombing. I remained there for eight days. If you watched CNN at the time, I led many of the bodies onto the C 130s. I left Yemen with the last of those bodies. It was a horrible experience, but I was blessed to bring the power of the priesthood and the Church to those Americans who were so desperate and so far from home.

I am now stationed with the Navy Sea Bees (CB stands for construction battalion) at the chapel in Gulfport, MS. It is supposed to be a three year tour. I will believe that when I see it.

I returned home from Bahrain on 1 November 2001 and reported here a few days before Christmas. It is really a wonderful place and the most relaxing assignment I have had in my ten years of active duty.

During my stay in Bahrain, I met a Navy Captain who will be the next Commodore for the Navy squadrons based at Tinker Air Force Base in Oklahoma. He was real excited to see my pictures of our Cherry Point Convention. Joe Sereno is a good Catholic and was real interested as I told him stories about NAPP. He asked me if we might like to hold a convention at Tinker in one of the next few years. I told him that might be a possibility and that the members would vote

on it. Joe knows that he would have to do all the work and hosting since I am not close to him. He said he would love to do it for the priests. Joe will be leaving Bahrain this fall. My suggestion is that we make a tentative plan for the 2004 convention at Tinker. I would tell Joe what types of things we usually plan and he would take care of the details.

If the brothers would like to have another meeting a military installation, Joe and his wife Marta would gladly be our hosts. We really would need an alternate as the current war on terrorism can change things in the military rather rapidly.

I have not done any civilian flying for some years. In the Middle East I was flying P-3s and once in a while doing touch and goes in a C-12 (King Air 200) in Kuwait. I do want to knock out my CFI while I am here for the next years.

Mel,

I am the National Director for the PMS in Australia. When visiting the Diocese of Broome in the North West of Australia in July, Bishop Chris Saunders spoke to me of the need to get a new plane for the diocese. I have commenced enquiries here with Cessna.

He spoke of the difference in price between the US and the Australian market. This is just an initial contact to sound out on a number of

questions.

1. If we have little luck with fund raising here, is there any possibility of any help from America?

- 2. If we are able to purchase a plane in US, it would need to be either flown or shipped out. If flying is the only option, would there be any interest in a couple or more of your members taking on the task of delivering the plane to Broome, which is one of our missionary dioceses in the country?
- 3. Have you any other comments or suggestions that we could put into place?

Once before Cessna had expressed some interest in using the donation of a plane as a

promotion opportunity for them. We are seeing if they are still interested. Also we are looking at the current suppliers of aviation fuel to the diocese. A mail-out to pilots in Australia and other interested persons or bodies is also being planned. Bishop Chris is to supply answers to some of their questions so that we can refine the mailing list.

Knobby Walsh sent the following from a Seasonal Newsletter of the Presbyterate of the Diocese of Rochester, NY

Father Tim Brown, Pastor of St. Charles Borromeo, Greece, recently joined the exclusive list of Priest Pilots.

After passing all the required tests and training, the FAA has granted him the License of Private Pilot, Single Engine Land.

Tim has always been interested in aviation. One of his earliest trips was to Saratoga Springs with Knobby and Joan Cawley to pick up an Irish Terrier puppy (Molly) for Father Conboy.

We call the list "exclusive" because it seems to be very limited in this diocese. During the war years, flying was frowned on in the Rochester Diocese, although no "rules" existed. Archbishop Sheen, a frequent flyer himself, approved of the activity.

Some of the senior clergy remember Fr. Don Cleary, chaplain at Cornell, as one of the early "helmet and goggle" pilots.

Knobby Walsh flew with Don and got a license in 1950. Msgr. Bill Roche received his license in 1945 and went on to an ever more exclusive list of CFII (commercial flight instructor instruments) single and multi-engine. Bill died a few weeks ago.

Msgrs. Joe and Gerry Gefell (Joe recently deceased) went on to all sorts of "ratings"; CFII, single and multi, land and sea and did lots of flying in the military.

Another pilot, Father Frank Erbe even owned part of a Piper Cherokee for a few years. He and Knobby traveled extensively through Canada and the Great Lakes.

For the past few years, Tim also belongs to a larger group of 162 in the National Association of Priest Pilots. There are some "associate" members; non ordained pilots who enjoy the group. This past year Knobby and Tim joined Mr. George Gratton and Mr. Jack O'Neili, Rochester airplane owners, in hosting the annual meeting at Wing South Airpark, Naples, Fl.

Archbishop Hurley of Anchorage hosted last year's meeting. Bishop Timlin of Scranton is a member. Bishop Kaniecki, S.J. of Fairbanks, AK died last year and Bishop Tom Lobsinger, OMI, of Whitehorse, died in an accident last year.


Mel please pray for good weather for the week of his celebration. May God bless you and all of the members of the NAPP.



MINUTES OF 2002 NAPP MEETING

ALBUQUERQUE, NEW MEXICO July 9, 2002

Our hands-on President, Fr. Ev Hemann called upon Fr. Jack Paisley to prayerfully open our 39th meeting at 4:35 P.M. at the Madonna Retreat Center in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Appreciation was warmly expressed by President Fr. Ev Hemann to our Associate Member and Hostess of the Convention (and President of our FOPPERS, i.e. Friends of Priest Pilots) Edwina Tabares and to her cohost, Fr. Bob Kirsch who were ably assisted by Fr. Paul Baseford, Frances Lopez, Shirley Love, Corine Romero, Vicenta Saavedra, Wil Tabares and LC Vail.

Our airport fly-in base was the Double Eagle II airport, Albuquerque, New Mexico. While most of our 39 attendees arrived either commercially or by car, seven member aircraft were on the ramp of West Mesa Aviation at the Double Eagle II airport: Attea, Gratton, E. Hemann, J. Hemann, M. Hemann, Kirsch and Werth.

We had a ground excursion to the Sandia Tramway (longest in the world) and to the Sandia Indian Casino. We had a second ground/air excursion (several planes flew to Socorro, N.M.) to the Very Large Array, a large plain of electronic telescopes listening to radio signals from the far reaches of outer space.

39 persons were in attendance, 3 Charter Members: Reverends John Hemann, Mel Hemann, and Bob Kirsch (Kirsch has not missed one in all 39 meetings. Miracle!); 21 Regular Members: Reverends Tony Attea, Paul Baseford, Bill Bevington, Joe Burg, Jim Flavin, Ev Hemann, (Rev.Mr.) Tom Jones, Merlin Kieffer, Dino Lorenzetti, Ed Murray, Gene Murray, Jack Paisley, Bob Pool, Al Ruschman, Jerry Scanlon, George Seuferling, Owen Shanley, Charlie Teufel, Tom Weinzapfel, Al Werth and John Wolesky: 8 Associate Members: Jeff Bryant, George Gratton, Mike Makelbust, Carmen Marchiole, Jack Divine, Edwina Tabares, Marty Winnert and Fred Wright: 3 Guests: Matt Hemann, Shirley Love and LC Vail; 4 Additional Committee Members: Frances Lopez, Corine Romero. Vicenta Saavedra and Wil Tabares.

MINUTES: The minutes of our 2001 Florida meeting were once again faithfully provided by Fr. Mel Hemann. motion: to accept the minutes: Wolesky/Jones; passed with one opposed.

TREASURER'S REPORT: A written report was distributed by Fr. Mel Hemann. From

NAPP Checking: Opening Balance: \$3,853.93 plus inflows of \$6,623.93 minus outflows of \$4,134.44 leaving 7/1/02 balance of \$2,489.49; NAPP Savings.

Motion.to approve Treasurer's Report: E. Murray/Ruschman: passed with one opposed.

DONATIONS: President Ev Hemann proposed that we set aside \$1,000 for two \$500 grants for 2 priests who have already passed their written and are working towards their private or instrument tickets. The new Bishop of Fairbanks, Alaska, the Most Rev. Don Kettler, former Sioux Falls SD diocese pastor was proposed as the recipient of the second \$1,000. A third \$1,000 grant being given to Pat Patten in Tanzania. Motion: Paisley/J. Hemann; that the two \$500 grants proposal, and the Bishop Kettler and Pat Patten proposals be accepted: unanimous passage.

ELECTIONS: Ist Vice President: Fr. Gene Murray nominated by Fr. Mel Hemann. motion: nominations be closed: that the Paisley/Seuferling; unanimous passage. Congratulations, Fr. Gene Murray Treasurer: Call for unanimous proclamation that Fr. Mel Hemann continue as Treasurer. Fr. Mel Hemann unanimously hailed as our continuing Treasurer; much appreciation for Fr. Mel Hemann and all his Dedication as Treasurer and as long time Newsletter Editor-in-Chief

CONVENTIONS: For 2003 Ames, Iowa proposed with Fr. Ev Hemann, Mike Makelbust and Jeff Bryant as hosts; Visit to Iowa State University campus for the world's foremost virtual reality room and a visit to Demonstratives, Inc. a company that animates aviation and other accidents, e.g., TWA 800.

There is a possibility of a flight to West Bend, Iowa to the Grotto of the Redemption. For 2004 Urbana, Illinois with Rev. George Remm and Rudy Frasca, manufacturer of Frasca Simulators co-hosting. Motion: to accept the 2003 and 2004 proposals: Teufel/Gratton; unanimous. For 2005, possibly St. Augustine, Fiorida or the new Air & Space museum at Dulles International airport.

<u>NAPP.</u> INC: We continue to be legally registered as a Non-Profit Corporation in the State of Kentucky thanks to the generosity and diligence of Fr. Al Ruschman. Kudos to All.

MEXICO REPORT: Fr, Bob Kirsch, Western Region Director, told of the continuing flights, three in the past thirty days transporting more than a ton and a half of medicines into the Sierra Madre range of northern Mexico in the State of Chihuahua with payloads of 1,600 lbs in "Queenie," our old Cessna 210.

The Sisters' clinics in these remote areas are heavily dependent on these medical flights. Dry foods, clothing and toys and donuts for the children (they know Fr. Bob as 'Padre Donas'). We do a lot of coordination as well with other agencies such as Rotary International, the Lions Clubs, the Mennonite Community, the Federal Govt. of Mexico and the Gov't of the State of Chihuahua. Our Convention hostess and Mexico pilot, Edwina, continues to be a special lady with the tower controllers of the Chihuahua International Airport.

ALASKA REPORT: The untimely death of our regular member and Alaska reporter, Fr. Jim Kelley just a year almost to the day of the death of Padre Pancho Chavez, left us without a hands-on report on the Alaskan Mission. Fr. Mel Hemann shared some information from the Chancery office in Anchorage. As previously noted in our DONATIONS the new Bishop of Fairbanks, Alaska, + Don Kettler hopefully will also be involved with Alaska Mission Aviation as is Archbishop Roger L. Schweitz, the new Archbishop of Anchorage, succeeding our member, the retired Archbishop Frank Hurley. Archbishop Schweitz has soloed.

Our Convention Holy Mass this year was offered for the repose of the souls of all our departed members, most recently, Fr. Jim Kelley, Msgr. Bill Roche, Fr. Tony Gendusa and all who are listed in our NAPP Necrology, and whose names were affectionately and solemnly remembered at the Mass. Fr. Bob Kirsch provided a casket in the Chapel to remind each of us of our coming "Graduation" from the School of Life into the Fullness of Life.
