The student walked back outside, looking around for a sign to see where he REALLY was since he knew he was NOT at Charles City where he intended.





Dear Mel and All the Members,

Bishop Don Kettler was ordained August 22, 2002. We had a great turnout for the occasion that covered three evenings and an afternoon. Wednesday evening we gathered in the Cathedral for prayer and the biessing of the signs of office. The next afternoon we spent almost three hours in our local convention center with Archbishop Roger Schwietz of Anchorage presiding at the ordination. Finally on Friday we had a Meet the Bishop dinner for the families in Fairbanks. There were lots of activities.

Saturday morning I prepared the Bishop's C-207 for departure to our outlying villages. A quick trip to flight service showed me that flying that day was out. Too much rain and cloud! Two airplanes had turned around from the same direction that we wanted to fly. We hung it up for that day. The next morning we were able to take off and fly without any trouble to a town called Galena in the middle of the state. We then tried to fly to Bethel in the southwest after the bishop dutifully gassed the plane. We covered about 45 miles before rain, clouds and smoke from forest fires forced us to turn back. The pastor of the church in Galena most graciously hosted us for the night. I said yes before I remembered that we had promised to have 8:30 AM Mass in Galena the next morning. I decided to try anyway.

The next morning we had Mass with the Bishop presiding. We rushed to the airport and were airborne by 9:30 AM. It was just right for climbing above the lingering smoke and flying direct to Bethel. Of course we ran into a nice headwind all the way to Bethel. We still managed to arrive by 12:15 PM and the Bishop

could say Mass. We had planned to spend two nights in Bethel before flying to Toksook Bay on the afternoon of our arrival. We therefore had nice lunch at the church and loaded the airplane for Toksook Bay. An hour later we landed in this village of about 500 people on the Bering Sea. After a great welcome at the airport we walked to the church for Mass. I had been pastor of this village for 5 years in the early 1980s. It was a wonderful homecoming for me. That evening we had a potluck and Eskimo dancing. They invited the Bishop to drum for the dancing. He was very honored.

The next morning we flew to Emmonak at the mouth of the Yukon River. We spent the afternoon and evening celebrating Mass, eating, dancing, and receiving gifts. The people were very gracious in welcoming their new Bishop. The next morning we flew to St. Mary's for a quiet afternoon followed by Mass and a reception in the parish. St. Mary's was my home before Bishop Kaniecki died so suddenly two years ago. The Bishop seemed to drink in all the sights and sounds. Because he has so much time in preparation for his private, I would take off and then let him fly to our destination. It sure was nice to sit back and leave the driving to

After St. Marys we flew to Nome in quite nice weather. Actually after the first two days we had no trouble with the weather. In Nome we stayed at the parish. Of course we had a great dinner with the parishioners that evening. A good night's sleep prepared us for a pleasant trip up to Kotzebue over the Seward Peninsula. It was new country for me, but the GPS kept me out of any trouble. We had beautiful weather that evening and enjoyed a nice dinner with the parishioners. A quiet walk through town gave a peaceful finish to our stay.

The weather continued to hold the next day. We were able to fly direct back to Galena. Only the last 10 miles gave me some extra work. With rain and fog around the airport, the visibility went down to about 2 miles. I received a special VFR from Anchorage Center and proceeded up the river at about 500 feet. The airport had not moved and we came in very nicely for the end of a great flight. The pastor of Galena was visiting one of his other parishes. We had agreed to stay for the 11:00 AM Mass before departing for Fairbanks on the last leg of the trip. Surprise of all surprises, we picked up a strong 15 knot tailwind all the way into Fairbanks. The trip

ended with the Bishop's coming to know something of the distances and difficulties that we face in Northern and Western Alaska. Now that it is over I would not trade the experience for anything.

This email from Pat Patten a few weeks ago

This late response is inexcusable on my part. I received your first email way back in July about NAPPs very kind and generous contribution to Flying Medical Service. It comes in an important period, as our budgeted \$10,000 poor patients' fund — which usually carries us through the year — got all used in January, and I've been borrowing from other budget lines to keep things going!

It has been a busier than usual year. We saw 18,000 patients in 2001, most of them from very remote areas. We averaged about two emergency flights a week -- in addition to our almost daily clinic flights. But this year started with 10 emergencies in the first ten days! Don't have a clue what our statistics will look like this year when we add them up at the end. It stays exciting, and ever new.

So... unlike for many of you Stateside, our flying hasn't slowed down. There are no TFRs. In fact, we have only one small prohibited area in the country. And the sky is big. We continue to be the only two planes flying single engine night IFR in East Africa. And we enjoy it.

Sorry my connections with NAPP are so distant, but do appreciate your newsletter and keeping all of us in touch.

EMRTHQUAKE DESTROYS ALASKA AIRFORT Emergency repair crews have begun work at Northway Airport (ORT) in Northway, Alaska, after damage from a magnitude 7.9 earthquake on Nov. 8 closed the airport. Northway, about 30 miles from the Canadian border, is a principal port of entry for light aircraft from Canada and the lower 48 states.

Although Northway was about 100 miles from the epicenter, the quake caused extensive damage to the 5,100 foot asphalt runway. Repair crews will plow up the paved runway and replace it with a temporary 3,200 foot gravel surface. Alaska's aviation community and the state's DOT are working to find a long-term

solution that can be implemented next summer.

"People flying to Alaska need to know this airport is closed and is liable to remain so for a few weeks," said AOPA Alaska regional representative Tom George.
