

Mr. Cyril V. Moore, of Westerly, Rhode Island, read an article in one of the newspapers in the East concerning our annual meeting in Rennsselaer, N.Y, and of our \$350.00 to the St. James Society. He contacted Fr. Vic Schoenberger, who had hosted the meeting, and offered to contribute something to help "spread God's Word."

Fr. Vic contacted our NAPP president, John Hemann, and said that a 1978 Piper Tomahawk, N9765T, would be available to our organization as a gift from Mr. Moore. The Piper Tomahawk is equipped with dual VOR's, DME, ADF, XTP and 350 TT. Value \$25,000.00.

This good news came to NAPP on November 2. Our president contacted the officers in order to decide what could be done with the "precious gift." Archbishop Frank Hurley of Anchorage, Alaska, was contacted and indicated his diocese would be happy to accept the gift.

In telephone conversations with Mr. Moore, President Hemann, has been informed that the NAPP or the Archdiocese of Anchorage can take the liberty to trade the Tomahawk for a Cessna 182 or some other craft that might be even more helpful in "spreading God's Word."

Through this edition of the "newsletter" we might find one of our members who could suggest where a GOOD Cessna might be located and might be able to provide an addition to the already "precious" gift and a trade could be made.

Presently the plan calls for the Tomahawk to be ferried to Iowa in early February. A hangar, rent free, will store it until May or early June when it will continue its journey to Alaska. Several priest pilots have already come forth and volunteered to transport the plane from its home in Rhode Island to its new service "for the Lord" in Alaska.

Our organization is deeply grateful to Mr. Moore for his generosity and we are happy to assist in helping his wishes to be carried out. Amazing what publicizing our generosity and concern for spreading the Gospel can accomplish!!

If you have any suggestions — about a trade of planes, about someone else who wants to add to the donation, or anything that would be helpful in this project, we ask you to contact NAPP President John Hemann, 319-233-5242. Incidentally, John is planning to ferry the airplane and another member has suggested flying to Alaska and bringing him home. This would be done in a four place so if two of you are interested in a trip to Alaska in May or early June, this could be ainice outing between Sundays or whatever can be worked out. 



The weather was marginal and yet he took her in that direction. About 9:15 PM they crashed 17 miles south east of Eau Claire, Wi., killing them both instantly.

Dan was one of the sharpest students I've ever had - an excellent pilot. Only two weeks before the accident I told him he was now in that "most dangerous" phase - flying long enough to get cocky and not long enough to really be that good. From reading the note pad with the briefing from FSS and a conversation with a friend we know he knew he was going into something that exceeded his capabilities. What drives one to do it?
