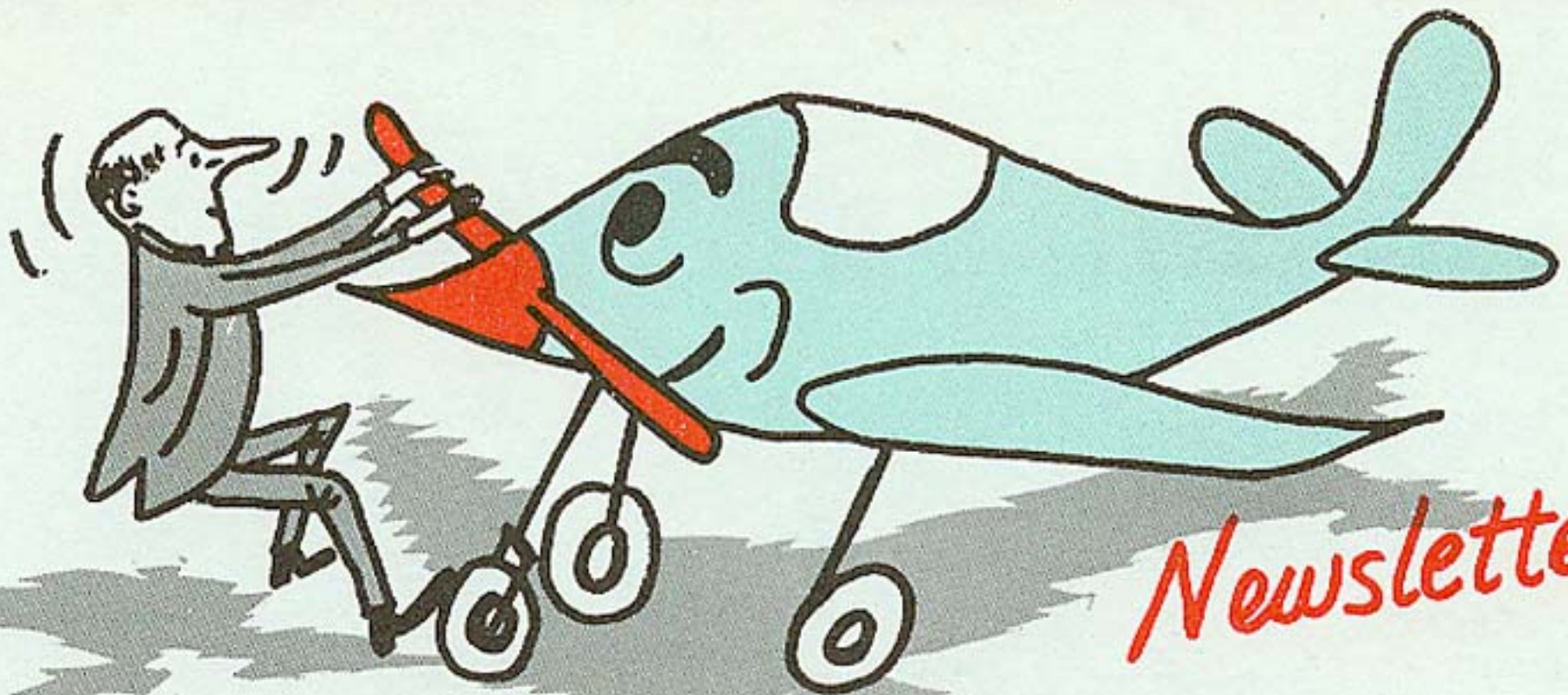

# ANNUAL MEETING

The General Meeting of NAPP was held on Tuesday, July 11, 1978 at Santa Fe, New Mexico, in Immaculate Heart Seminary. Our President, John Hemann, called the meeting to order at 10:30PM and requested a prayer be offered by 2nd V.P. Ray Radzieta. This year's attendance was super: President John W. Motion: John Dompka moved that the minutes published be accepted. Ray Radzieta and Dick Greene seconded. Motion carried.

The next order of business was the Treasurer's report. Charlie explained the report and commented on the convention fees. No income was shown last year. The reason being that it was being taken care of by the individual host and the convention was not put through the organization books. Ray Radzieta made the motion that the Treasurer's report be accepted. Dick Greene seconded. Motion carried.

Next order of business: A letter of communication from a young man in Ghana (25 years of age), George Crankston, was read. George asked for money to finance his training as an airplane technician. Since nothing was known about him some members felt an investigation should be done before honoring his request. Robert Kirsch reminded the members one of our purposes is to support the Missions. No money was voted for George Crankston at this time.

Motion: Mel Hemann made a motion that \$1000.00 be donated to Bishop Leo Arkfeld in Wewak, New Guinea. Kirsch seconded. Motion carried.

President John Hemann read a letter from Abbot Charles Corrison in which he said that his schedule prevented him from being present but sends his regards to all.

The next order of business concerned the member categories or kinds of membership. The difficulty arose because for the first time we have a married deacon member. Charlie Teufel presented a simple order: charter membership, regular and associate. Much discussion followed and no one seemed to accept the idea. To clarify the various types of membership, the constitution was read.

Motion: Charlie Teufel made a motion that the constitutional categories be followed. Jack Lawler seconded. Dick Greene amended the motion to put the question to a committee study and report back next year. Seconded by Ev Hemann. Not Passed.

Bob Sennott said, "Let's keep it simple." Amend the constitution to include permanent deacons under associate membership as stated in the by-laws. He put this in the form of a motion. Seconded by Jack Dompka. Motion carried.

The Executive Committee suggested that a pictorial brochure be made. It was felt that we might remember what we look like from one year to the next. Each member would be asked to send a passport photo. Some thought it might be

Motion: Dick Greene made a motion to send a congratulatory telegram and prayerful wishes to Pope Paul VI on his, and our, 15th anniversary. Seconded by Alex Sigur. Motion carried.

The next order of business was the election of officers. Officers to be elected: 2nd VP, Treasurer and Secretary.

2nd VP nominations were Dick Greene and Robert Kirsch. Motion by Irv Weber that nominations cease. Seconded by John Herzog. Dick Greene withdrew and Kirsch won with all our blessings.

Nominations for secretary were Barry Flisk and Nick Rossello. John Friederick closed nominations. Barry Flisk had to bow out because all officers must be priests. Nick Rossello won by full approval.

Treasurer nominations were Charlie Teufel and Dave Hogan. Dave withdrew and Charlie was re-elected treasurer.

The subject came up as to where the 1979 convention would be held. Tony Attea volunteered the New York gang - Tony Attea, Vic Schoenberg, and Nick Rossello - because it was due to come East. The sun rises in the East and, of course, everyone loves New York.

Motion: Jack Paisley made a motion to give Bob Kirsch a cheer for such a fine convention. Seconded by Sigur. Motion carried and an appropriate cheer was given.

Motion: Al Sigur made a motion to adjourn. Seconded by Mel Hemann. Motion carried. Deo Gratias!

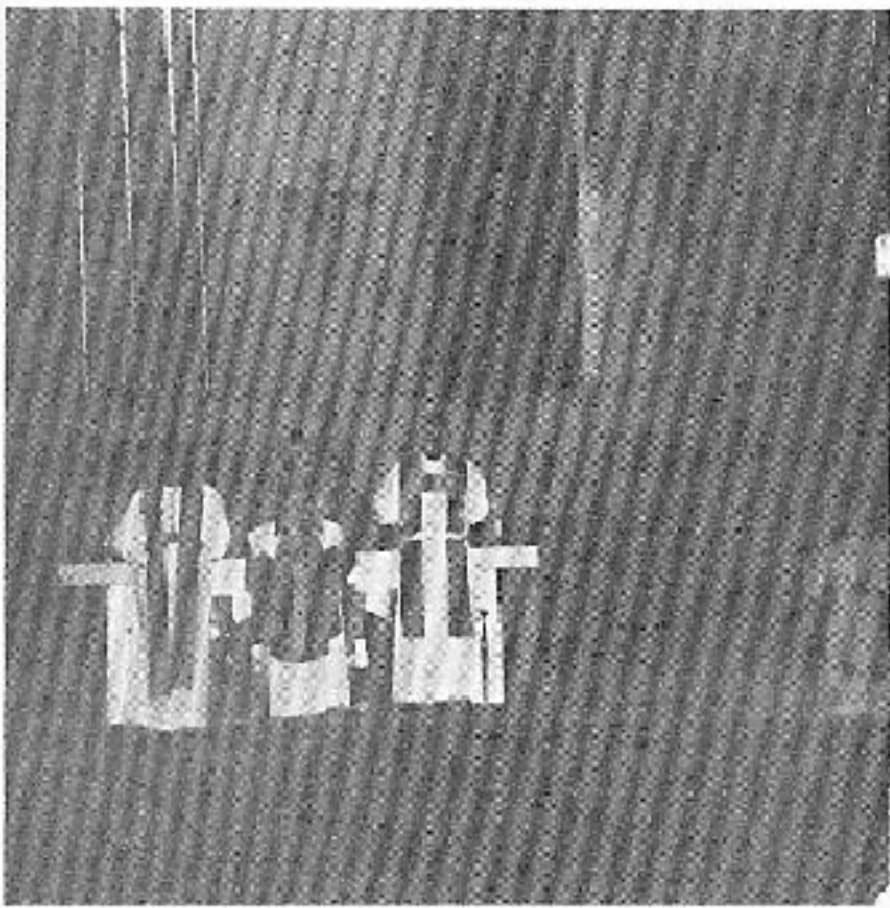

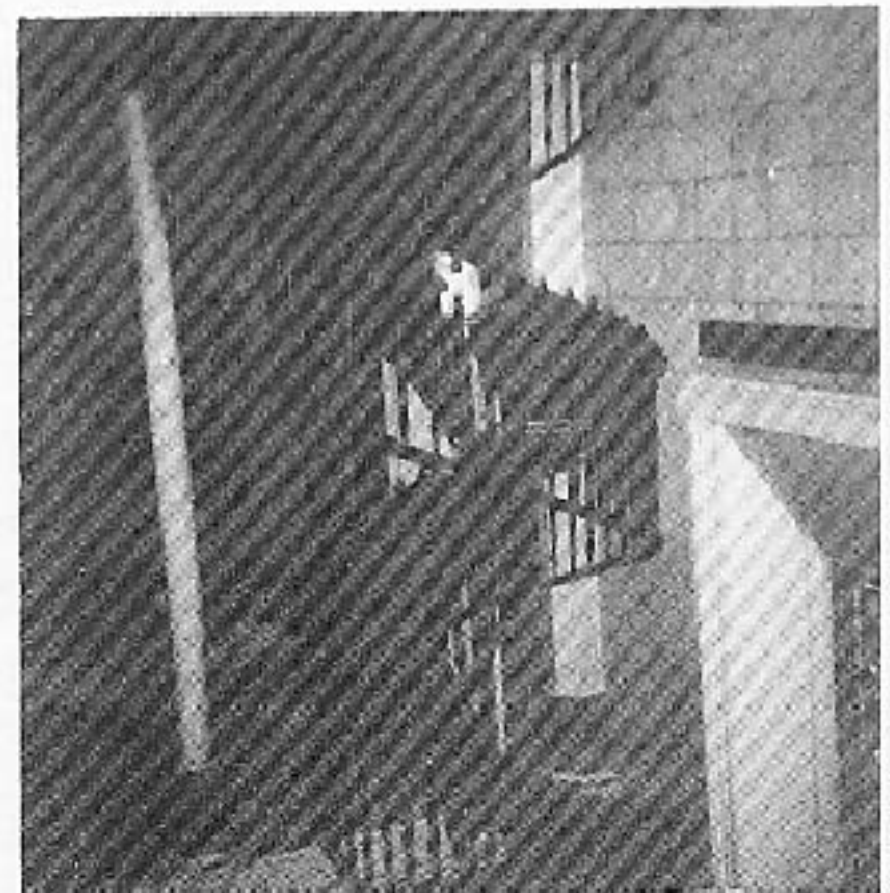

## AREA NAVIGATION SYSTEM

(Simplified theory-of-operation)

(Some of the NAPP Members are beginning to fly planes with RNAV. Through the courtesy of Barry Brown, Nancy's husband and pilot for Collins Radio, I obtained the following from some of the Collins Engineers. I'm sure it will be helpful).

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The following is an explanation in simplified terms of the operation of a typical area navigation system.

"....The aircraft knows where it is at all times. It knows this because it knows where it isn't. By subtracting where it is from where it isn't (or where it isn't from where it is depending on which is greater), it obtains a difference or deviation. The area navigation system uses deviations to generate corrective commands to drive the aircraft from a position where it is to a position where it wasn't; consequently, the position where it was is not the position where it isn't. In the event that the position where it is not is not the same as the position where it originally wasn't, the system acquired a variation (Variations are caused by external factors, and the discussion of these factors is not considered to be within the scope of this report), the variation being the difference between where the aircraft is and where the aircraft wasn't. If the variation is considered to be a significant factor, it, too, may be corrected by the area navigation system. However, the aircraft must now know where it was also. The "thought process" of the system is as follows: Because a variation has modified some of the information which the ANS has obtained, it is not sure where it is. However, it is sure where it isn't and it knows where it was. It now subtracts where it should be from where it wasn't (or vice versa) and by differentiating this from the algebraic difference between where it shouldn't be and where it was, it is able to obtain the difference between its deviation and its variation, this difference being called error. (Some companies also produce an extremely complex ANS system, but this type of navigation does not lend itself to simplification of theory),.....
