

The Famous Flying Hemanns All 3 Brothers, Priests, and Pilots•



There were once three brothers named Hemann from Stacyville.
Each of the boys grew up, attended Visitation High School and Loras College. All three became priests. And all three became pilots.

The eldest, Melvin, joined the priesthood following a stint in the United States Air Force. While assistant pastor in Decorah, Father Melvin possibly decided he wasn't close enough to God, so he remedied the situation by taking to the skies. Now assigned at St. Joseph's in Chelsea, Father Melvin remains a charter member of the National Association of Priest Pilots, an organization of which he is a past-president and also the editor of the group's world-wide newsletter.

The second eldest, John, followed in his brother's jet stream and became a priest pilot. Father John is also a charter member of the priest pilot organization and is currently president of that group's 218

members.

Father John holds the rank of major in the U.S. Military Chaplain Corps, and is the State Chaplain for the Iowa Army and Air National Guard. He spent part of the summer in active duty in Minnesota before returning to his post at the Team Ministry at St. John's parish, Waterloo.

The youngest brother, Everett, could not wait until he was out of high school to take to the skies, first as a pilot, then as a priest pilot.

He now teaches at Regis High School in Cedar Rapids.

Two of the brothers, Fathers John and Everett, have shares in a single-engine plane, Bonanza.

These three brothers have another brother. Although he is not a

priest, he is a pilot.

The three priests have three sisters. Two of them are married to pilots.

And now they have been honored in the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C. In the aviation section there, a large photograph of the three priests hangs with a caption reading: "The Hemann brothers are all members of the National Association of Priest Pilots. Three members of the same family in the priesthood may not be a rarity but three priest pilots in the same family certainly is. Rev. Mel Hemann, left, is the highest rated priest pilot in the world holding the Airline Transport Pilot rating."

Bob Fisher, the local FBO and an Accident Prevention Counselor for the Des Moines GADO, spoke on safety. He emphasized the importance of not waiting until disaster hits before acting. Host Gene Murray was used as an example. While flying several priests to Dubuque in the TurboArrow he noticed a vibration in the engine over Waterloo. He declared an emergency and landed. This was the 7th incident of engine failure in a TuboArrow caused by the crankshaft breaking. Gene's incident, because of his quick thinking, was the first one when the pilot landed with the engine intact. Continental has taken the 600-hour engine and is replacing it with a zero-time one.
