---- MISSING SOME OF MY FRIENDS



Flying Grandfather, Conrad, Dead at 76

April 3, 1979

Pioneer pilot Max Conrad died in his sleep Tuesday at the home of a friend in Summit. New Jersey, relatives reported. He was 76.

Conrad, known as the "Flying Grandfather", had been cited for logging more flight time than any other pilot.

In January, he received the first Eagles of Aviation Award presented by Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, Daytona Beach, Florida. He had logged more than 50,000 hours or the equivalent of almost six years airborne. Many of the flights were over the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, which he crossed nearly 200 times. In doing so he earned six distance and endurance flight records.

The pioneer pilot from Winona, Minnesota, learned to fly in 1928 and operated a flying service in the City until 1943.

Conrad first gained worldwide attention when he flew the Atlantic in a tiny plane in 1950 "just to see my kids" who were then living in Europe.


Some of his more spectacular nonstop flights included those from Chicago to Rome in March 1959, New York to Sicily in June 1959, New Jersey to Ireland in March 1958, New York to Paris in October 1954, and a record-breaking flight from Winona to New Mexico City in August 1951.

He established a speed record for light planes in 1953 when he flew from San Francisco to New York in 22 hours and 24 minutes. In November 1959, Conrad (then 56) flew non-stop from Casablanca, North Africa, 6911 miles to El Paso, Texas.

The above was taken from the Winona paper. I am sure there will be many words written about him in the months ahead that will once again point out the tremendous contributions he has made to aviation.

We are running in this issue the group picture taken at the charter meeting where Max was the speaker at the banquet. I am sure it will bring back some fond memories to a lot of you.

Speaking for myself, I must say the opportunity of getting to know Max and see him quite frequently over a period of about ten years, leaves me with some fond and precious memories. To be invited to be part of the departure ceremony as he tried for that flight over the poles, to visit at his home, have him drop by my office on various occasions, share the grief of his wife's untimely death.... After that, he never seemed to ease that restlessness that was so much a part of his life but which Betty always seemed able to at least momentarily pacify. Being the excellent Catholic gentleman he was, I am sure that in death he has at long last found the peace that escapes all of us in this life.

ADDENDA TO MEL'S CORNER


