

I almost forgot this one - attached to Archbishop Leo Arkfeld's calendar. Written to Co-Missionaries in February of 1986. "Who are Co-Missionaries? They are relatives and friends who are interested in our Mission work.

out here at the ends of the earth. Many thanks to all of you.

There are 2 general classes of people over here - namely, the native people and outsiders. Outsiders are people from other countries who work here for the government or are in some business. Now what about foreign missionaries like myself? We have been given the classification of local people or natives. So, in many ways, I and our other foreign missionaries share in privileges of our local people.

Here is an example of this. I went to the dentist recently. She was a native woman, working with others in a government hospital. She checked my teeth, ground down a broken filling, and charged me 50 cents. In another country I suppose that might have cost 25 dollars. Here a non native would have paid about 10 dollars. I was charged 50 cents because I have the rank of native. Any native who would have received the dental care I did, would also have been charged 50 cents.

Now a few words about Confirmations. That is usually a serious, devotional service. Sometimes, however, there are a few interesting human elements. When I arrived in the diocese of Wewak in 1949 as the new bishop, one of our priests asked me to come for Confirmations. Very innocently, I went there for the normal Sunday Mass at which the sacrament would be given. It was very hot. We started off as usual, fully attired with cope, miter and all the things the bishops wore in those days. After about 150 received the sacrament, the miter had to taken off. Gradually, whatever vestments were not really required were laid aside. There were over 500 Confirmations, and that was at the very start of work as a bishop. After that I always made sure the priests would limit the classes to about 175 or less. The next largest class that I ever allowed was 300. That was in a place where no bishop had ever been before. I had to go in by helicopter, because I could not manage the hard walking to get there. All went alright, because that place is about 4700 ft. above sea level and rather cold.

Here is an incident that perhaps no bishop has ever experienced. A woman of about 30 years of age came up for Confirmation with 2 black eyes and bleeding lips. She was beaten up by her husband, but that did not stop her from coming up for Confirmation.

I will probably get a Co-Adjutor bishop during 1986. Sometimes there is more work than I can handle.

Barrett —spreading ministry

to handicapped

As Isaac the Clown, the Rev. Miles Barrett, associate paster of St. Cecelia's Catholic Church, Algona, spreads his ministry to the handicapped with carefully developed programs using mime, music and choreography.

As Isaac the Clown paraded through the room waving a rod with a long, colorful streamer, Adam, an autistic fourth grader, got locked onto the motion.

He caught the mood of the music and joined the others in coming forward when the clown swept his outstretched arms inward and upward, miming, "Let us come together and give thanks" at the Exceptional Opportunities commencement in Burt.

Those with handicaps have the same feelings of wanting to celebrate and be involved as those with out handicaps, said the Rev. Miles Barrett, associate pastor of St. Cecelia's Catholic Church, Algona.

The 36-year-old Catholic priest, with a master's degree in music and six years of jazz and classic dance experience with the Siouxland Civic Dance group, bridges the gap between the deaf and hearing impaired, autistic, mentally retarded and those without disabilities by using timed and choreographed programs involving mime and music.

Barrett, who started his clown ministry when he was in seminary eight years ago, "brings the Word to life, and life to the Word, without a word."

Without speaking, Isaac the Clown bridges all denominations, Barrett said.

In "STINKIN" THINKIN", Isaac the Clown pulls out a garbage bag that's heavy and smelling with sin. He gets rid of the planks of greed, hate, jealousy, sexism and racism and replaces them with sweet-smelling faith, hope and charity.

The clown holds the bag full of balloons loosely as he lets it pull him off his knees to his feet. As the bag rises over his head, he lets go and the balloons scatter into the congregation, and everyone takes part in the celebration of "letting go and letting God."

A child's attention span is limited to seven minutes, but that act, with large, exaggerated movements, and no vocabulary to not understand, lasts only three minutes. Then Isaac the Clown is off to another part of the 20-minute service.

He tells stories using smoke bombs and a Christmas gift and uncovers swaddling cloths to reveal refreshments of grape juice and bread for all.

But Isaac isn't an entertainer. Barrett, the man behind the white paint, doesn't have the time.

Along with his other responsibilies at St. Cecelia's, Barrett is president of Algona Clergy, unit chairman for the

South Kossuth County Chapter of the American Cancer Society, is helping to organize an Algona-area hospice, and more. He is an instrument-rated pilot and a member of the NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF PRIEST PILOTS.

He was recently commissioned into the U.S. Navy and now serves two days a month with the Naval Reserve in Sioux City. He said he will serve two weeks a year probably at Balboa Hospital, San Diego, CA, and attend officers training this spring or summer.

But Barrett takes time to "celebrate the gift of playfully proclaiming the majesty of the one Lord by reducing all presumptuous claims that any human rank or order can ever be absolute," according to the bulletin for Isaac's "Heart of a Clown" prayer service.

That 20-minute presentation, which took 100 hours to choreograph, takes four hours to arrange with the help of a couple adults each time it's presented.



Barrett has seen clowns with scratched and smeared paint looking more like "a Halloween horror show." He takes care in putting on his paint and preparing the show. Each "act" is carefully taped, timed and choreographed with music ranging from a full orchestra to classical guitar, distant church bells to strings. Sometimes the music is accompanie by gentle singing.

The result isn't a substitute for mass, Barrett said, but a supplement to other models of prayer for children. However, Isaac's prayer service can help them get more out of the regular mass, by heightening their awareness as to what's going on, Barrett said.

Among his responsibilities as an Iowa Pilot Parents board member is to be available to work with ordained or lay ministers of all denominations who want to reach out to the handicapped in this way.

He has put on workshops, instructing how to apply the makeup, become a character and tell a story with mime.

Barrett has appeared at the Kossuth County Hospital, Kossuth County Care Facility, a diocese Renew program event. among others, but gives no surprise presentations. His clown ministry works best with advance notice and preparation

Before Barrett petitioned to become a priest in the Sioux City diocese, he gave a couple presentations to see if the diocese was open to his clown ministry.

"I wouldn't be happy if I wasn't me," he said.

This one comes from Lincoln, NE: "I guess it's about time I let you fellows know that I have changed assignments. Six months ago I was transferred to the Cathedral as Rector. The new title is confusing -- all the work and responsibility of a pastor remain.

My only regret is that I now have to travel 100 miles to the West (Hastings, NE) to work on my Mond motor-glider. By the way, do you know how rany NAPP'ers are EAA MEMBERS?

The first weekend was held in Florida in 1984 and has since spread to other areas of the United States.



THE NEET EXPERIENCE

The NEET EXPERIENCE is a weekend designed for singles - widowed, separated, divorced, or single.

The overall purpose of the weekend is to offer the individual an opportunity to examine one's attitude toward oneself and then how best to relate the person "I AM" to other significant persons in my life.

The purposes and goals of the weekend are achieved through a series of exercises under the guidance and direction of the Team conducting the weekend.

PHASE I: THE INNER SEARCH FOR PEACE

A time to become acquainted with the other participants in the group.

This is followed by a time to be alone and reflect upon the significant persons who have helped to shape and form my life.

Additional time is then provided for each individual to look more deeply within himself or herself.

The phase concludes with an opportunity to be reconciled with God and fellow human beings. For those who desire it, the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be celebrated.

PHASE II: THE SURPRISE OF SURPRISES

The Team introduces the participating individuals to the love and beauty of Gcd as found in the Scriptures.

Time is spent effecting on each person of the Trinity - Father/Creator, Son and Holy Spirit.

Each segment of this phase ends by sharing with others in a small, intimate group what has happened in my reflection and prayer period.

NAME

 The entire group re-assembles and an opportunity is offered to share insights
 with other members.

PHASE III: THE OUTREACH

Intimacy is a need shared by all.

The Team guides the participants into a deeper awareness of each person's relationship with and within the Trinity and how this relationship, which of its very nature is founded in love, must reach out to others.

Opportunities are then offered to experience this love in God with those in the group.

PHASE IV: THE RESOLVE: A JOYFUL UNION

The concluding portion of the weekend provides an opportunity to make definite and concrete plans as to how the insights and experiences of the first three phases may be carried out in the future.
