

Dear Mel.

Thanks for your letter of October 22, and sorry for taking so long to respond.

The May 4 date for the NAPP Regional gathering here at Wisconsin Rapids looks just fine. I have a huge rectory (it was once a convent, so it has <u>lots</u> of rooms), so will probably be able to accommodate 3 or 4 guys right here, if they wish.

As far as things to do are concerned. I have a couple of ideas. Consolidated Papers is starting up their newest paper machine in March; it's a half-billion dollar toy, and will probably make an interesting tour. So that's one possibility. We have some parishioners that own a cranberry marsh and would probably be glad to show us around; trouble is, there probably isn't a lot of activity on the marshes in early May. I'll look into it though, and find out. One other possibility that comes to mind is Hardwood Range. It's an Air National Guard gunnery and bombing range (R-6904 on your charts) and is open to the public. It's about a 40 minute drive from here, but if you like seeing military aircraft (everything from A-10's to B-52's) in operation, it's worth the trip. Only thing is. I think that Monday is normally a slack day for them. But I can check on that. too, as the time draws nearer.

As you may know from looking at the charts, Wisconsin Rapids is under the boundaries of the Volk East MOA. That's only a problem for IFR flights, and only when the MOA is hot. But R-6904 is a factor even for VFR flights: Green Bay Flight Service can be contacted enroute to check on its status.

Well, that's some preliminary information for you. Keep in touch, and in the meantime I'll try to explore the available options.

Dear Father Frank:

Many thanks for the swift reply to my letter of inquiry concerning NAPP.

I would like to add one footnote: After WVII, Army flight personnel were afforded the opportunity of transferring to the newly created Air Force. I did so without hesitation and joined various Air Force Reserve units as a "Weekend Warrior" thru 1956. I was recalled to active duty for the Korean conflict. However, my employer, the United States Government, in the person of one J. Edgar Hoover, demanded 100% loyalty on the part if his Agents. So, I remained both an Agent & a Weekend Warrior. The compromise was requesting relief from active duty orders thus remaining an Agent and assisting Air Force Intelligence with contacts in New York's Chinatown as a Reservist.

Left Mr. Hoover in Aug. 1956 & entered St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore, MD I was required by the Bishop to resign my commission & in four years, June 1960, was ordained for the Diocese of Wilmington. The Bishop assigned me to some extra duties: 1) Chaplain, Department of Delaware, Veterans of Foreign Wars, 2) Chaplain, Delaware State Police & 3) Chaplain, Delaware Army National Guard. In this last capacity, I was recalled to Active Duty in Oct. 1966 by Army. Remained in the Service (incl. a three year extension) until retirement in September, 1985. Since then I have been assisting during the vacation months at our two-churched parish in Ocean City, Maryland. About six of us handled 17 Masses on the weekend. Vacationers are from many areas and jam the Masses to capacity. From November til April, I languish in the tropical sun of Florida. I also help out at times down there, St Catherines

A side note: In the early 60s, my Bishop (Hyle, RIP) complained at a Clergy Conference of his inability to adequately visit his priests & their parishes because of the length of our diocese. I raised my hand to advise him that if the diocese would acquire the use or purchase a chopper or a small 2 or 4 seater Piper Cub or Cessna, I'd be very happy to become flight qualified & assist in the problem. His Excellency weighed 300 pounds, including episcopal trappings (shoes, gloves etc.). He bellowed for all priests to hear, "Father, I enter no aircraft unless it has four engines"!

I hope this stuff does not bore you Frank. I appreciate your sending my original letter to Father Wel and he will receive a copy of this one as soon as I ready my application for NAPP.
