


MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

A STORY ABOUT MARIAN



Back in January I was informed that a young woman by the name of Marian had just moved into the parish. Marian had cancer of the liver. She and her husband, who is a major in the army, have one child. The doctors had hoped that they had removed all the cancerous cells. Unfortunately, this was not the case. Marian was told that unless she received another liver she would die. The Army gave her husband a compassionate transfer to the Pittsburgh area so that she could be near the transplant team of Dr. Thomas Starzl. Marian was examined and found to be a good candidate for such a transplant. The hospital gave her a beeper and told her to wait until until a liver would be available.

The time came in the afternoon of January 12. Marian was in the hospital by 4 o'clock. After the usual paper work and preliminary tests she was on the operating table. She was cut

from the breast bone to the navel and on both sides of the rib cage...like the bottom of an anchor. Our parish flooded her with hundreds of get well cards including best wishes from our four bishops. At first the liver was rejected and her temperature continued to rise. After that was controlled Marian began to improve and was able to return home around the middle of February.

HOW IT ALL HAPPENS. Whenever a healthy liver is available...usually after an accident...

Dr. Starzl and his staff are alerted. Then the doctor or some of his associates are on their way to Allegheny County Airport with a police escort. The various corporations such as Alcoa, J & L, Mellon Bank, etc., make their jets available on a rotating basis. The doctors take off and when they arrive in a city perhaps hundreds of miles away they are rushed to another hospital by police escort. The healthy liver is removed, placed in an igloo picnic cooler container and the return trip to Pittsburg begins.

Meanwhile, another team of doctors has already begun the preliminary steps of the operation. Marian was on the operating table for 16 hours. And the cost? It is staggering. In Marian's case it will be over two hundred thousand dollars plus the pills which cost

hundreds of dollars each week. The doctors have amazing stamina. One of my doctor friends told me that Dr. Starzl is an exceptional man. Very unassuming, he is an extremely skillful specialist who can be in the operating room for over half a day at a stretch. Marian often wonders whose liver she has. The doctors will not reveal this. But Marian did mention that a day never passes by that she does not say many prayers for the person whose death has given her a new lease on life.

William Edwards, Executive Vice President of Wings of Hope, wrote to thank all of us for the contribution of \$1,000.00 we sent them.

I talked with Mel on Monday. Reservations continue to come in for the gala Hemann Jubulees - the second week of July. In order that Mel and John can set everything in order, it is necessary that they hear from you as soon as possible. It is going to be a great event. You will not want to miss it.



BRIEFS FROM HERE AND THERE...

From CRUM OF THE NEWS, March 19, 1984 issue.

From past president, Dick Skriba, Chicago:

"I've wanted to send you a note for the past several months, not necessarily news, but may be a few tips that the NAPPers might find useful. "HELPFUL HINTS" might be the heading of a section of the newsletter, 'cause almost everyone of us learns about tips for better flying.

- 1. I subscribe to a bunch of aviation publications but 2 of the best (all be it most expensive) are "Light Plane Maintenance" and its sister "Aviation Consumer." There are a lot of good tips in both publications.
- 2. At the EAA convention last year I bought a pair of Ruppert shoulder harnesses. I didn't want to drill holes in the floor/roof, etc. to install them so I used 2 old regular lap belts, attached to the regular mounting points already in the Cherokee and looped the harnesses into the old seat belts. It seems to work quite well. The "old" seat belts are in addition to the lap belts that are normally used, but they go behind the front seats to enable the harness to attach via the harness loop and go over the seat, back to front. (Confused??? -- really, it's simple!!).
- 3. For timing tanks (& legs sometimes) I have a small inexpensive kitchen timer. It's loud enough to warn you of I hour or less. Mount it with a bit of velco on the top of the panel.
- 4. Also for time, get a small digital clock ---. They sell for about 2 bucks. They keep relatively good time & if you mount it in an open spot between any of the dials, it'll fit. It's only about 2 inches in diameter or less.

There's probably more I meant to share with the lads, but may be this'll be a start for other padres to share their AVIATIPS.
