


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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



Over a year ago I had the privilege of joining approximately 40 civic leaders from the Pittsburgh and Columbus, Ohio area on a trip to the Whiteman AFB in Missouri and then on to the Barksdale AFB in Louisiana. Bad weather delayed the trip a few hours. As a result, we missed the opportunity of seeing a B 52 being refueled in the air.

On the way to Columbus something unexpected happened. A small plane became lost in bad weather. One of the air force crew picked up the mayday signal. From our altitude the small plane looked like a little fly. The pilot would dip into the clouds and then reappear above them. The pilot of our KC-135 stratotanker managed to reassure the lost pilot and had him remain above the clouds. Meanwhile, the big tanker radioed the exact position of the small plane. Soon a good shepherd twin made his appearance, caught sight of the lost sheep and led him to safety in a nearby field.

Because of our delay in reaching Columbus, we had to make hurried departure to Whiteman. When we arrived, the

tables were set for lunch. While we were eating we saw slides of the work of the missile men and women and then had a quick tour of the facility.

Then on to Barksdale AFB in Louisiana. We were met by Lt. General Robert Herres and his officers and placed aboard an air force bus to the motel. The cost of the motel was our only expense. An hour or so later we were taken to the Officers' Club for a delicious meal and entertainment that included the Air Force Orchestra.

The next day we had breakfast with the B 52 crews. They explained their work and then took us out to see the B 52's and the new KC-10 advanced cargo/tanker. The General mentioned that he was more afraid of a small country getting the atomic bomb than he was of Russia. He said that we know pretty well what Russia has and they know what we

have but we do not know what some little maniac will do.

Then it was back to the plane. Since we did not have a refueling exercise on the way down, the General arranged for a number of fighter planes to be sent up and be refueled. We saw the whole procedure including the boom operation at the rear of the plane.

It was a very interesting trip and if you ever get the opportunity to go on such an excursion, I suggest you make every effort to do so. It is good to know that so many young people are watching over us night and day.

The way it looks now we have enough RV's and campers lined up to offer everyone the ultimate in sleeping quarters and transportation.




My remarks in this issue will be on the up-coming Convention.

Last Sunday and Monday, June 17 & 18, co-hosts Mel, Matt & John Hemann met on the Hemann farm to finalize convention plans. (See picture at right).

All is ready -All we need is YOUR reservation.

Please get that to me as soon as possible.







The 2600' N-S grass strip should be in good shape by convention time. If you have been watching the news of late you will note that the midwest has had more than it's share of rain this year. However, by Convention time all should be in marvelous condition.

The landing strip is pictured at left. Elevation is 1200 MSL and there is a high line at the south end.

Once you find the town of Stacyville, the Hemann strip is easy to find .. one mile straight north of the church steeple shown at left below.

We recommend working with Mason City FSS on 123.6. In filing your flight plans - VFR or IFR - simply put in the REMARKS that you will close with Mason City. (MCW).

I will forward to MCW the N numbers of the registrants I have. The personnel are great people and have assured me they will do anything to be of assistance.

When you approach the Hemann air strip we recommend you call in on 122.9 MHz. We will have radio available to reply and give you airport advisories. If everyone does this it should make for a much safer operation.

If you are too low to close with MOW in the air we can do it by phone.






One last item on the convention. At left is a picture of the home place. The road in front of the farm buildings is roughly N-S, with N to the right. Parking will be to the south of the buildings marked P on the picture.

From this viewpoint the landing strip is to the west off the top left corner of the picture.

We just received word a couple of days ago that Santa Fe Communications out of California will be at the convention on July 11 with a film crew.
