
Let the strides toward peace and economic justice continue to grow for the benefit of all the brothers and sisters on our increasingly small earthly home. OREMUS!

Alaska arbp. says Mass in the Soviet Far East

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (CNS) — Archbishop Francis T. Hurley of Anchorage celebrated an early Christmas Mass Dec. 21 for about 270 people in Magadan, the city in the Soviet Far East where he is building a U.S.-Soviet ecumenical center for religion and culture.

What was believed to be the first public Catholic Mass in Magadan was celebrated in a workers' union hall. The Soviet port city of 160,000 on the Sea of Okhotsk was founded in 1932 by Josef Stalin as a forced-labor camp.

On earlier visits to Magadan the archbishop had celebrated two private Masses for a handful of people, but the Christmas Mass was the first that was advertised and open to the general public.

During his Dec. 15-30 visit, Archbishop Hurley communicated with Anchorage by fax, a telephone interview with the Anchorage Daily News and a telephone call to his older brother, Rome-based Bishop Mark Hurley, who had flown to Anchorage to stand in for the archbishop for Christmas midnight Mass at his cathedral.

Bishop Hurley told Catholic News Service Dec. 26 that the archbishop met more than 50 Catholics in Magadan who were willing to sign up to form an association, as required by Soviet law, in order to form a legally recognized religious congregation.

"The government has leased him two-a: d-a-half acres for \$50 a month" to build the ecumenical center, which will have a chapel, Bishop Hurley said.

In a fax message Dec. 20, Archbishop Hurley said his six-member American delegation "had a good meeting with (Magadan regional) Gov. Vyacheslav Kobets. He restated his support for the center."

The proposed site for the center, he added, "looks very good. More than enough land for the building. Next to a polytechnical school. Many apartment houses. There is a new Intourist hotel under construction nearby."

Archbishop Hurley first visited Magadan in July 1969 as part of a U.S. delegation from Anchorage on a scientific exchange program with the Soviet Union. He broached the idea of an ecumenical center for culture and religion at that time and received an encouraging response from Soviet authorities.

As the plan advanced he made a second visit in February 1990, and in October a delegation of Magadan civil and religious authorities visited Anchorage to sign a formal agreement to build the center.

The delegation for the December visit included Adventist and Pentecostal officials and an Anchorage archdiocesan priest, Father Michael Shields of St. Michael's Parish in Palmer.

The group also brought a ton of vegetables, fruits and meats to distribute to needy families in Magadan.

In a phone interview with the Anchorage Daily News, Archbishop Hurley said the planned building will be "kind of like a retreat center." Construction should start "within two years," he said.

He said that after the Mass a Soviet worshiper came up to him and asked him to come back often because "they killed our faith and this will help bring it back."

"I assured him that the number of people at Mass was a sign that they did not kill the faith," the archbishop said.

Bishop Hurley told CNS that he asked his younger brother the archbishop to do some work for him, too, while he was in Magadan.

The bishop is on the board of directors of the Overseas Blind Foundation, based in his former discess of Santa Rosa, Calif. He said the foundation ships about 5,000 pounds a week of Braille books and literature to 43 countries, and "I asked Frank to represent the foundation in Magadan."

He said the archbishop reported back to him that there is no school for the blind in Magadan, but there is an association of the blind which would welcome Braille literature.

The archbishop was originally due back in Anchorage Dec. 30 but was negotiating to extend his visa a few days and make a trip to Vladivostok to visit a school for the blind which the foundation assists, Bishop Hurley said. He said if the archbishop got the extension, be would return borne in early January.

And Bishop Hurley's plans when he leaves Anchorage? After visits to San Francisco and Boston "I'm leaving for the Soviet Union from New York Jan. 22."

The hishop said he plans to spend a week in Moscow on foundation business.
