Pond Racer Update

he long wait for the muchanticipated flight of the Rutandesigned twin-engined Pond Racer is nearing reality. During the week of January 7th, 1991, the Pond Racer officially began a series of pre-flight testing. Testing will take place throughout the month and include a series of extended engine run-ups with and without engine cowling and several low and high speed taxi exercises. The official first flight with pilot Dick Rutan at the controls, has yet to be announced, but is expected within the next 30-45 days. Great care has been taken in the installation of the final cowling of The Pond Racer engines. The two Nissan Twin-turbo 1000hp, 3.2 Litre V6 engines, are virtually

the same engines used in the two-time IMSA Camel GTP Winning, Nissan prototype race car driven by Geoff Brabham. Various cowling, wiring, radiator plumbing and cooling requirements have provided a multitude of problems and as can be seen in the accompanying photos, certainly make for a tight engine package. Specifications of The Pond Racer are impressive. Constructed almost entirely of aerospace composites with a gross weight of approximately 4000lbs., this sleek, 2000hp racing aircraft is expected to attain speeds in excess of 600mph. The Pond Racer will make its racing debut at Reno and an official assault on the Propeller Driven Aircraft Speed Records will begin in late 1991.

John Bellon sent parts of a letter <u>Jim Falsey</u> sent from Fairbanks, Alaska to his home diocese, Saginaw, Michigan.

"We had a gathering of the Fairbanks Diocesan Priests in Anchorage March 4-7. Four out of the five of us made it. There are only three diocesan priests actually ordained for the Diocese of Fairbanks. Two of us are on loan ...

"By pure coincidence, the Iditarod Dog Sled race was starting while I was there (Anchorage). On my way back from Anchorage, I stopped to say Mass in Unalakleet. Again, it just happened that the first mushers were passing through Unalakleet before I left for Nome ...

"The parishes are very small here. The people are not liturgically sophisticated. The buildings are basic survival shelters. The furnishings are homemade plywood and 2 x 4 construction, with the alters doubling as storage cabinets. The liturgical style is mid-'60s. You do the best you can with what you've got ... The other problem is how to cover two parishes that are 150 miles apart ..."

Jim's plans were bold. Holy Thursday in Nome, Good Friday in Unalakleet. A 7 p.m. vigil there of Saturday, then fly to Nome for an 11 p.m. vigil there. But the weather was to be the determining factor.

Adopt a Parish

Those in attendance at the 1975 Nashville Convention will recall the hospitality of HARRY and ALICE HOSEY. A recent article on them.

HARRY AND ALICE had two choices. On a Caribbean cruise, the Tennessee couple, Catholics with 14 children, could have hopped into a limousine and joined the rest of their shipmates for a night of drinking and dancing at a hotel in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. Or they could have wandered off to see firsthand the real Haiti.

As the poet says, the two chose the less-traveled path. The rest, as they say, is history.

The Hoseys happened upon a notorious slum and were appalled by the poverty. But the Hosey's found what they were searching for: a way to give their children an outlet for works of mercy.


The Hosey's visited Haiti in 1957. Since then, the Hosey's have almost single-handedly linked 250 U.S. parishes in 49 dioceses with all 212 Catholic parishes in Haiti.

This one Catholic family has led the way in substantially helping an entire country. Their "adopt-a-parish" program enabled advances in religious education, literacy and political empowerment.

It was a measure of the contributions the Hoseys have made to Haiti that they were invited as Honored guests to the inauguration of Jean-Bertrand Aristide as Haitian president. The 37 year old Roman Catholic priest from a small parish helped lead the battle against the Duvalier family dictatorship to become the country's first elected president in its 187-year history.

"In my own mind, the difference of the poor people who did the voting had to come from help through education to realize they're human beings and had rights," said Hosey, 79, in Old Bickory, Tenn.
