Father James Ratchford, a long time friend of Henry, delivered a very personal and informative eulogy in Henry's behalf, accenting the use of his gift of writing in expressing the teachings of the Church and his love of flying. The family expressed their thanks to all his friends for their prayers.

I look forward to a good report. I would love to have been there. I'm getting the new transponder. Seattle is trouble area without it.


I finally have a priest flying buddy in the archdiocese. With a new paint job for 3636K I expect to be getting over my non-flying period."

He was going to stop at the state house down the street the next morning to get a handicap license for his car. He went into detail on the intentions he had in offering his sufferings caused by the cancer that wracked his body. He talked of his funeral plans. For me it was a very inspiring hour and one that gives great food for reflection on life and its values. Thank you Henry for what you have given the priest pilots of the world.

A word of thanks is certainly in order for Al Ruschman. Although not a pilot himself he has been a friend and flying companion of Henry's for years. When Henry was no longer able to continue with the preparations, Al stepped in and did a masterful job of putting the final touches on a well run and beautifully organized convention. 


Fair Play Mahuhah, by Rock Sand




