

The loss of life is always tragic. But the sheer number of violent deaths in peace time is unprecedented and shakes our lives. The majority of our population has never experienced such vulnerability and lack of security. We are anxious and frightened.

The events of these two months have encouraged many to reexamine priorities. Faith and family emerge as much more important values. I live on a college campus. Young people, who tend to emphasize individuality and personal freedom, suddenly are recognizing the need for community. It is important to gather


and discuss important issues. Students spontaneously gather to PRAY together!

This is a time of faith and opportunity for spiritual growth. Let us seize the moment. As many examine their lives they are incredibly open to hearing the message of placing our trust in the Lord. For many, it is the first time they have understood that invitation because it is the first time that they have experienced such radical vulnerability.

Young people have not been asking questions about values like this since the 1960s. It is also a time many want to examine questions of justice, peace and war. People my age and younger are asking, "Why is it that so many people don't like us? What is it about our life style that makes others perceive us as the enemy?"

It is difficult to find anything good in such violence. But for people of hope, the grace of God is present. Can you think of any better example of Paschal Mystery than NYC response to the terrorist attack?

He also included a financial report on the south Florida convention in July. We include it for all to see and thank those who made donations for the benefit of us all.



Msgr. Joseph Gefell, 85; a Rochester diocesan priest for 60 years, died of pneumonia-related causes on Oct. 13, 2001. Msgr. Gefell lived with his twin brother, Msgr. Gerard Gefell, in Cape Vincent, NY., where they served on weekends at various parishes.

Ordained in 1941, he joined the Army in 1943 and served as a chaplain in the Pacific theater until 1945. He reenlisted in 1947, and served in the Philippines, Japan, Germany, Vietnam and the US. He made 96 parachute jumps during his military career. He retired as a colonel in 1973 and subsequently served various parishes until his retirement in 1990.

Plane crash claims lives of Oblates

wo Oblate priests were killed in British Columbia Aug. 20 after their plane crashed near a national park.

Fathers Brian Ballard, 51, and Ivan Mc-Cormack, 69, were killed while on their way to an Oblate conference in Calgary. Their plane crashed 110 kilometres south of Valemount, B.C., near Jasper National Park.

Both priests were avid pilots, reports The B.C. Catholic. For nearly 20 years Fr. Ballard flew into remote northern communities, crisscrossing the Prince George diocese from his Flying Missions base in Smithers.

Fr. McCormack was Prince George vicar general and pastor of Our Lady of the Snows and Our Lady of Good Hope in Fort St. James.

"I have flown with Fr. Brian and know how meticulous he was about his plane. It was a beautiful day and they were on course, so it's one of those mysteries of life. It's hard to lose two such active men," said Oblate Father Otto Rollheiser, provincial of St. Paul Province.

The Transportation Safety Board of Canada is investigating the crash.

Fr. Ballard was born in Wichita Falls, Texas. The son of a U.S. Air Force pilot, he grew up near a Texas airfield. He entered the novitiate in Amprior, Ont., and studied theology at Edmonton's Newman College before being ordained in San Antonio in 1978. In 1982,

gan flying to remote sites. In 1991, he established the Flying Missions base in Smithers.

Fr. McCormack was ordained in 1958 in Ottawa. He went to Prince George in 1960 and was appointed to Fort St. James last year. He started the Flying Missions about 1975, said Elaine Farrell, pastoral assistant to Fr. Ballard.

"The story is that Fr. McCormack was

he went to the Fort St. James missions and bepicked up once by a mail plane and became convinced that flying would be a far better way to reach the villages," Farrell said.

This marks the second time in a little than a year that Oblates have died in a small plane accident. In April 2000, Bishop Thomas Lobsinger of Whitehorse, Yukon, and Oblate Brother Hubert Spruyt were killed in a crash north of Whitehorse.
