

He is one of 4 boys in the family, all pilots, as well as a few of their sisters. One brother was in service and was killed on a flight returning to Hawaii on Dec. 9, 1941 from a mission looking for Japanese subs, ships or planes. Tom & his 2 brothers owned a plane together which they flew all over the western hemisphere, both North & South America. As the sole remaining owner of the plane, Tom said, "I started flying in 1941. After 56 years of accident free flying I thought I'd probably used up all my lucky breaks so I sold it."

Tom O'Neill, our Vancouver Island host, continues to send me information about the island. Beginning with the February issue I'll have put together some kind of listing of all the possibilities available to us when we meet there. The reservations will go to Tom; room reservations will be made directly with the Inn that will serve as our gathering spot. 

BRIEFS FROM HERE AND THERE

Two E-mail messages from Bert Pepowski contain the following information.

Dear Mel, (November 10, 1997)

It's been a while since I've been in contact. I'm going to be away for some 4 months doing some missionary flying down in the Galapagos Islands starting December 9th. It is going to be on a rotation basis, and originally I'm to stay there and fly a Piper Aztec to and from 3 islands in the Galapagos. The plane is down there already and is in service. The pilot that is down there now is getting things set up. The different protocols and manifest forms, etc. It should be pretty much set by the time I get there. Initially my primary task will be to simply fly, but as I learn some Spanish, some ministry is certainly going to be a part of this. But initially this flying is a kind of sabbatical and I'm looking forward to it.

I just received the NAPP news and was surprised to hear of John Dompka's final flight, and also about Jack Lawler's accident. I would like to run down there to visit him. At the moment my time is quite limited because of preparations for this flying stint in the Islands.

When I get down there, I'm taking a Laptop with me and hope to have access to some kind

of E-mail service.

The corporation that we (The Franciscan Secretariate of the Missions) and the Wagner Foundation (as in Dick Wagner of Wag Acro) have formed around this Aztec is called "ALAS FRANCISCANAS LTD".

The Wagner foundation was formed by Dick and his wife Bobbie to preserve aviation artifacts and memorabilia. It quickly branched out into missionary work in Belize and New Guinea helping to finance flying and medical service.

Latest update on Jack Lawler 12-14-97 via phone conversation with his niece Donna.

About the time you received the last newsletter Jack was airlifted to St. Elizabeth Hospital in Brighton, MA. Donna said he has his 'ups and downs' medically. He continues to have fevers which is mystifying the medical personnel. A couple of weeks ago they took the ventilator off for a couple of hours. Donna placed her finger over the incision in his throat and he was able to speak briefly. He said he remembers the accident. He did not run out of gas. He says the autopilot didn't go off or disconnect. Since that time he has been on the ventilator but remains alert. Donna said she read the last newsletter to him and he smiled when some of the names he recognizes came up.

John Bellon sent me a copy of a picture of Jack's plane at the accident site at the Purdue University airport. I don't know how well the copy of a copy will reproduce but we'll give it a try. Jack's present address:

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF PRIEST PILOTS MINUTES

Annual Meeting - Wednesday, July 9, 1997

Our worthy President, Fr. Tom Geelan, functioning in great form (belying his lame-duck status) opened our 34th meeting with a prayer on Wednesday, July 9th, at 3:30 PM. We were using the facilities of the Chapel at Cherry Point, N.C. Marine Corps Air Station. This was the first time we had convened at a Marine military base. Our fly-in base was the civilian airport at New Bern, North Carolina. Our admirably performing Convention host was member Fr. Mike Mikstay, Chaplain at the MCAS. We were all pleased with our housing at the New Bern Sheraton Hotel. Grateful acknowledgement of Fr. Mike's outstanding performance was expressed by President Tom accompanied by spontaneous applause by the membership. Formal acknowledgement with much appreciation was made of the marvelous hospitality we enjoyed as extended by the entire Base and which was personally arranged by the Base Commander, Gen. Kara Markovich through the agency of Fr. Mike Mikstay. At one point the entire Base Flight-line was closed down for fifteen minutes for our "tour." As conscientious taxpayers we were very proud and pleased as to how our 'contributions' to the IRS were being put to good use at the Cherry Point MCAS!

40 persons were in attendance: Of our 14 remaining <u>Charter Members</u> (veterans of 34 years) 5 were present: Reverends John Bellon, John Hemann, Mel Hemann, Bob Kirsch and Phil Schmitt; 26 Regular Members: Reverends Tony Attea, Tom Ayoub, Bill Bevington, John Dompka, John Esquibel, John Friederick, Tom Geelan, Everett Hemann, Dave Hogan, Jim Kelley, Dino Lorenzetti, Bill Martin, Mike Mikstay, Ed Murray, Gene Murray, Frank Nemmers, Jack Paisley, Bill Roche, Nick Rossello, Al Ruschman, Owen Shanley, Pete Sweeney, Charlie Teufel, John Walsh, Al Werth and John Wolesky; 6 Associate Members: Jack Boyle, Bill Browne, Ron Cervantes, Tony Facciolo, George Gratton and Fred Wright; 3 Guests: Jeffrey Bryant, Ted Keller and Mike Macklebust.

<u>MINUTES</u>: Copies of the Minutes of our 1996 Angola, N.Y. Meeting (courtesy of Newsletter editor Fr.Mel Hemann) were distributed and reviewed. <u>Motion</u>: For acceptance of the Minutes was made, seconded and passed unanimously.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer, Fr. Pete Sweeney, reported that former Treasurer, Fr. Ev Hemann, continued in service until Christmas 1996. We have a Reserve Fund with the Diocese of Dubuque at \$6,725.00 which includes \$725.00 interest for two years. This Reserve Fund is not to be touched. Our Newsletter mailings cost approximately \$1,000.00. Motion: That the Report be accepted was made, seconded and passed unanimously. It was understood a detailed report will appear in the Newsletter.

<u>NAPP, INC</u>: Fr. Al Ruschman has again personally paid the fee so that NAPP, INC. continues to be legal under the laws of the State of Kentucky.

1998 CONVENTION: We will convene on Tuesday, July 7th and Wednesday, July 8th, 1998. Three sites were proposed: 1) Anchorage, Alaska (we have a standing invitation from member Archbishop Frank Hurley); 2) University of Dayton, Ohio (proposal from Fr. Tom Schoene) and 3) Nanaimo, Vancouver Island, British Columbia. This invitation being made by member Fr. Tom O'Neill. Fr. Tom is pastor of an ecumenical church. We would be at the Retreat House; there is 1 1/2 hour ferry ride to the mainland; there are two airports on the island. Motion: Fr. John "Knobby" Walsh/Fr. John Esquibel: That we convene at Vancouver Island; passed unanimously.

1999 CONVENTION: The Dayton University proposal by Fr. Tom Schoene is still in place. For 2000 we still have the tentative offer by Fr. Ev Hemann at Ames, Iowa for a "tete-a-tete" with a developmental single engine civilian jet.

REGIONAL MEETINGS: The midwest Regional Meeting will be held on Sept. 29th and will be hosted by Fr. Ev Hemann. Fr. Bill Martin proposed the formation of a Northeastern Region.

NEWSLETTER REPORT: Editor Fr. Mel Hemann reported that the postal and printing costs continue to go up and that we only have a 5% return on our money now. Fr. Mel suggested \$20.00 for dues. Motion: Fr. Jack Dompka/George Gratton: That the dues now be \$20.00; unanimous passage. (Our fiscal year begins with July 1st which makes us more in line with Convention time). There was further discussion about our investments. Fr. Bill Roche spoke of investigating Money Markets; Fr. Ev Hemann spoke of Mutual Funds; That an Ad Hoc Investment Committee be appointed: Passed unanimously. President Geelan then appointed Fr. Pete Sweeney, Fr. Everett Hemann and Tony Facciolo. (Fr. Pete Sweeney continues as Treasurer).

MEXICO REPORT: Fr. Bob Kirsch gave his annual report on the continuing flights of the SAN MARTIN FLYING MISSION, Inc. C-210, the "Mission Queen": the latest efforts are to identify the more remote areas of the Tarahumara indigenous peoples, evaluate needs, check on possible 'airstrips', etc. Fr. Francisco "Pancho" Chavez (who was with us in 1996) is still flying the Tarahumara Diocese's Cherokee Dakota 260 XB-ETB covering a vast area of some 56,000 Tarahumaras. The Indian orphan lad, Braulio (also with us in 1996) is now in training as a pilot/mechanic at Aldama, Chihuahua and Fr. Bob expressed his appreciation for our continuing support.

<u>DONATIONS</u>: Motion: Fr. Bob Kirsch/Fr. Ev Hemann: That our donation of \$1,000.00 for this year go to member, Bishop Tommy Lobsinger, OMI, Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, Canada. Passed unanimously.

ELECTIONS: President: Fr. Bob Kirsch nominated Fr. Al Werth; Motion: Fr. Tony Attea/Tony Facciolo: That the nominations be closed; passed unanimously. Congratulations to our new President Fr. Al Werth. Secretary: Fr. Jim Kelley nominated Fr. Bob Kirsch; Motion: Fr. Tony Attea/Fr. Bill Roche: That the nominations be closed; unanimous. Fr. Bob expressed his appreciation of the continued confidence of the members. 2nd Vice-President: Fr. Mel Hemann nominated Fr. Jim Kelley; Motion: That the nominations be closed; passed unanimously. Congratulations to Fr. Jim.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT: of Fr. Tom Geelan, outgoing President. Well done, good and faithful servant!

NEW BUSINESS: 1) Call for prayer for our member brothers in ill health: Msgr. Bob Sennott, Msgr. Alex Sigur and Fr. George Schneider; 2) Remember to use our "N" numbers for our E mail, etc.; 3) Prayers requested for member Joe Murray. A "Get Well" card was signed for Joe; 4) Fr. Tony Attea can supply update disc for the Garmin GPS 90; 5) Fr. Al Ruschman requested a history of NAPP in our Directory; 6) Fr. John Hemann mentioned contact with Our Sunday Visitor and upcoming NAPP article. Tracie, the photographer with us these days, has been hired by OSV to supply pictures; 7) Archbishop Hurley sends his regards and is still recruiting retired priest pilots for perhaps a short tour in Alaska; 8) Fr. Jim Kelley mentioned a parish which the Maryknollers have in Magadon, Siberia with pastor Fr. Frank Moselin; 9) Fr. Bob Kirsch and Fr. Mel Hemann talked about the need for a new NAPP brochure.

ADJOURNMENT: Motion: Fr. Ev Hemann/Fr. Phil Schmitt: That we adjourn; Unanimous. Adjournment at 4:20 PM; meeting duration: 50 min. (Miracles never cease happening!), Remorsely_submitted 'lately'
