Spiritual checklist for Advent is similar to making wise piloting decisions ... before it's too late

Dear brother priests, pilots, faithful ones and friends of NAPP,

Pilot error remains a significant issue in the general aviation industry, with most accidents being attributed to mistakes



made by pilots. In 2020, 69.1% of all general aviation accidents were caused by pilot error. This means that the pilot was directly responsible for the incidents through a lack of knowledge or proper training, misjudgment or poor decision-making.

There should be no excuse for these types of accidents. Proper planning is an essential duty of

Mark your calendars for the 2024 NAPP Convention, which will be held in Fredericksburg, Texas. Arrivals will be Monday, September 16, with convention activities on Tuesday and Wednesday and departures on Thursday, September 19.

Fr. Phil Gibbs, NAPP president, has been busy working on plans for our annual gathering. He is grateful for the planning assistance offered by his brother and sister-in-law who live in Texas.

Lodging and convention headquarters will be at the <u>Inn on Barons</u> <u>Creek</u>, a boutique hotel at 308 S. Washington St. (We originally were hoping to stay at the Hangar Hotel, but it is booked during our intended stay.)

During our stay, enjoy all the Hill Country of Texas has to offer in a



relaxing, small-town atmosphere. The Inn on Barons Creek is conveniently located two blocks from historic Main Street, within walking distance to dining, shopping and other attractions. Picturesque Barons Creek flows through the back of the property and provides a tranquil and serene setting.

any pilot. These accident statistics show there remains a significant number of pilots who do not maintain this individual responsibility. And, now that I said all this, I most likely jinxed myself.

Truth be known, there is a proven set of regrets that a pilot tries to avoid in his or her flying career. We strive to develop good habits that help us avoid these regrets. Nevertheless, these regrets remain, and we can certainly learn from them.

Set your sights high and fly above the pattern altitude of the world's expectations to the greater heights of the Lord's expectations of you.

The first regret is the amount of runway left behind on takeoffs and landings. The second regret is the amount of altitude or airspace that remains above you in case your engine quits for whatever reason. The third regret is the amount of Avgas you left in the fuel truck back at the airport when what little is left in your tanks is about to run out while in flight.

The season of Advent is a season of preparation and expectation, proper planning and adequate decision-making. It is imperative that we light our lamps and be wise servants who await their master's return. How does this translate into our lives? Perhaps we can use the metaphors of avoiding the regrets of aviation as a guide for our life of holiness and develop good habits.

First, use your life, all of it, the entire length of it from the threshold of its beginning at birth to the threshold of its end at death. Use it to your advantage of first


getting off the ground with Jesus Christ as your copilot and then finally coming into the end stages of life's landing with him as well. Avoid the regrets we have commonly come to know as "I could've," "I should've" and "I would've." Start now in cultivating your relationship to Jesus Christ and do not delay.

> Secondly, fly beyond that of the minimum altitude. Don't be a minimalist when it comes to living your faith. Set your sights high and fly above the pattern altitude of the world's expectations to the greater heights of the Lord's expectations of you. Don't settle into the status quo but soar above

all the earthly things that weigh us down. Fly higher with your heart and your mind in communion with the heart and mind of Jesus so your glide slope may lead to a soft and safe ending.

Thirdly and finally, don't subject yourself to the error of fuel starvation. Spiritual fuel is readily available in steady and abundant supply every time we gather for Holy Mass. In the Eucharistic feast, when the Word is spoken and the Bread is broken, Jesus makes himself present for our consumption to fill our tanks so that when it comes to welcoming him back, we may be prepared to greet him. To quote one of my favorite

fighter pilot lines from the movie "Independence Day," as we anticipate his ultimate return, may we be ready to "kick the tires and light the fires" in order to meet him when he comes again in his glory.

nished two-room guest suites. Our convention room rate is \$139 per night, plus 6% state tax and 7% local tax, for a total of \$157.07 per night.

A deluxe hot breakfast bar is included each morning. There is complimentary wireless internet service throughout the hotel and a heated outdoor pool.

NAPP is renting the Van der Stucken room from 4 p.m. Monday through 11 a.m. Thursday for hospitality and meeting functions.

Important notes from the hotel:

- Individuals are responsible for making and guaranteeing their own reservation from the NAPP block of 20 rooms.
- To receive the group rate, call the hotel **830-990-9202** and make your reservation before August 16. Provide your arrival date (September 16) and request a room from the NAPP block.
- The group rate is not available online; the hotel will not honor the group rate for reservations made online.

Fr. Phil and the convention team look forward to welcoming you to Texas for an enjoyable convention. Stay tuned for details on activities and dining plans.

General aviation arrivals will be at <u>Gillespie County Airport (T82)</u>, three miles southwest of downtown Fredericksburg. It has a 5,000-foot runway. Fuel services provided by <u>Fredericksburg FBO</u>.

The Texas Hill Country is home to more than 100 wineries and vineyards and Fredericksburg is the epicenter, with more than 60 wineries, vineyards and wine-tasting rooms in



Msgr. Frank Mouch, one of NAPP's charter members, sent this photo and a note in November: "My first plane (Taylorcraft) and the second (Twin Beech), be-

fore it was cleaned up, governmentsurplus, owned by the Josephinum



Seminary (in Columbus, Ohio). It cost \$250."

Observant readers of this newsletter may recall that Msgr. Frank fondly wrote about the Twin Beech in the December 2019 edition:

I soloed in 1957. In 1958, having joined the faculty of the Josephinum Seminary, I bought one-third of the Taylorcraft pictured on the school's grass strip. In 1961, the seminary bought two C45 aircraft (Twin Beech) for \$250 each from government surplus, one to be used for spare parts for the one to be used. (Those are patches on the one to be parts; it had to be flown only once from Arizona to Ohio.) At 200 hours, I was cleared for multiengine and instruments and became the "corporate" pilot. I concluded my flying career in a Seneca II, which used half the fuel of the C45 and flew 30 mph faster.

Msgr. Frank now is retired and living in Lutz, Florida, north of Tampa.

One more story about Msgr. Frank Mouch

The <u>Gulf Coast Catholic</u>, published by the Diocese of St. Petersburg, has a remarkable story about an 84-year-old woman who was welcomed into the Catholic Church earlier this year.

Msgr. Frank Mouch, an NAPP charter member, celebrated the special Mass at the St. John XXIII Residence, which is on the third floor of <u>Angels Senior Living at The Reserves of Idlewild</u> in Lutz, Florida.

The Vatican, September 29, 1964

Purpose:

- 1. To promote the use of private aircraft as a practical, safe, and efficient tool of the apostolic work of a priest.
- 2. To cooperate with other aviation and ecclesiastical groups wherever possible in order to promote aviation in the cause of the Church.
- 3. To insist on the safe and proficient use of the airplane by its members.
- 4. To encourage the use of private aircraft as worthy of the talents and dignity of priests.
- 5. To further the use of aircraft in the missions.
